N.O.H.A. TO HAVE SAME GROUPING AS LAST YEAR

 continued applause. Every man in the room was anxious to see him retain the presidency for another year, but he refused to consider it. Similarly when the secretaryship came up and Mr. Charlton was nominated the applause was very insistent. When Mr. Charlton declined man after man got up and urged him to stay, until it was finally arranged that he be given an assistant, and he agreed to remain on that condition. When Mr. Campbell made his refusal definite, Percy Mader of Sudbury was unanimously voted president. The members felt that while Mr. Campbell had done such excellent work and deserved the honor with Percy Mader to the helm, the ship would be well handled. Mr. Mader will be a splendid president, as he is always courteous, broadminded and fair, and in addition he has what a president of the N.O.H.A. needs, lots of backbone. He will not only make good decisions, but he has the courage to back them up and enforce them.

Angus Campbell was chosen delegate to the O.H.A. Cochrane was admitted to membership in the Association. This makes the intermediate grouping: Cochrane, Timmins and Iroquois Falls. Cochrane has no junior team this year, so the junior grouping in the north will be, Timmins and Iroquois Falls.

A number of matters were dealt with at the general meeting. It was decided that transfers were necessary when a player moves from the O.H.A. to the N.O.H.A. or vice versa.

It was decided also that in places where there is no junior team a junior player may play with the nearest town in which there is an N.O.H.A. junior team.

Penalty boxes from now on must be covered and protected from the public so as there will be no interference with players serving penalties.

A resolution presented by the Soo asking for three subs instead of two, was voted down.

Means of encouraging juvenile leagues was discussed at some length and finally left to the new Executive, as was also the question of a separate entrance for visiting team players, and reduced rates on the railways.

There was a big fight over Canadian Soo's application to have the Michigan Soo play in the southern group on the understanding that they could not represent the group in case they should win that group but that the highest Canadian team in the league would represent the southern group in their play offs. The move was strongly opposed by Sudbury and a number of other delegates, but the final vote was eleven to ten in favor of instructing the new executive to immediately communicate with the O. H.A. to try and have this arranged. It is understood, however, that there is considerable opposition in Toronto to this movement, the claim there being that Canadian teams should have first call and as Sudbury gets the worst of the deal that it would not be fair to admit the Michigan Soo to the detriment of Sudbury. The intermediate and junior schedules have not yet been drawn up. Mr. G. W. Turk, of the Falls, is convener of the Schedules Committees, for these sections in the northern group. YOUTHFUL CRIMINAL SENTENCED AT THE FALLS

A young fellow giving the name of James Simard was sentenced last week at Iroquois Falls by Magistrate Atkinson to a term not less than one year and not more than two years less one day on charges of theft and forgery. The charges against him for offences at Iroquois Falls included theft and forgery, while three other charges were also laid against him by Chief McInnis of Tisdale. The Tisdale charges were in connection with illegalities with cheques passed on South Porcupine business men, or attempted to be passed on them. The young man admitted the forging of no less than fifteen cheques as well as the robbing of some mail bags at Iroquois Falls last summer. He told the authorities that when he was only 13 years he was sent to the reformatory and there had learned shoemaking, painting, forgery and other legal and illegal arts. Chief Morbey of Iroquois Falls recently brought the young fellow back from Montreal to stand trial for his breaches of the law.
