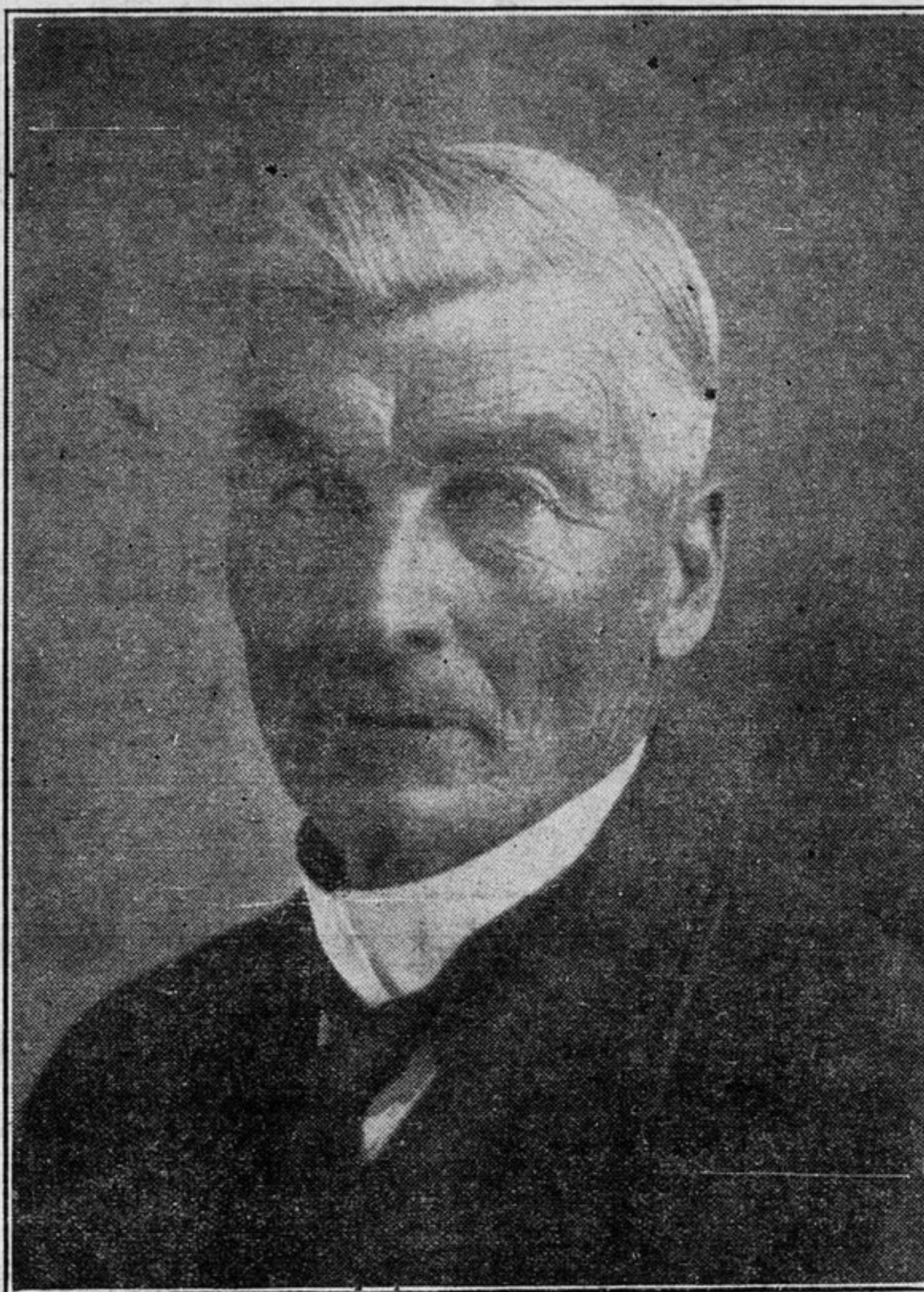

ANOTHER ADVANCEMENT FOR INSPECTOR MOORE

License Inspector Blackwall Also Promoted. Re-Organization of Provincial Police System.

Announcement was made at Toronto last week of appointments under the re-organized plan for the Ontario Provincial Police. The appointments include that of Inspector Walter Moore (formerly of South Porcupine) to be District Inspector for District No. 7 with Headquarters at Sudbury, and including, Sudbury, Temiskaming, Nipissing, Manitoulin Island and Algoma; and License Inspector Blackwall to be provincial inspector for law enforcement for Northern Ontario.

The following are the appointments in detail as announced last week by the Ontario Government:—

The six district inspectors who have been appointed are as follows: J. H. Putman, District No. 1, comprising the counties of Essex, Kent, Lambton, Middlesex and Elgin, with headquarters at Windsor, C. F. Airey, former police inspector at Niagara Falls, District No. 2, comprising the counties of Oxford, Norfolk, Brant, Wentworth, Haldimand, Lincoln and Welland,

with headquarters at Niagara Falls; M. C. Beckett, former license inspector at Owen Sound, District No. 3, comprising the counties of Bruce, Grey, Huron, Perth, Wellington, Waterloo and Dufferin, with headquarters at Kitchener; A. E. Storie, former Sudbury inspector, District No. 5, comprising the counties of Victoria, Haliburton, Peterborough, Northumberland, Hastings, Prince Edward, Lennox and Addington, with headquarters at Belleville; W. T. Moore, former police inspector, District No. 7, comprising the districts of Sudbury, Temiskaming, Manitoulin, Nipissing, and Algoma, with headquarters at Sudbury; C. W. Symons, former inspector, District No. 8, comprising the districts of Kenora, Rainy River and Thunder Bay, with headquarters at Port Arthur.

All these district inspectors, under the revised plan of operation, have direct charge over all provincial police officers in their districts and are responsible for the administration of criminal law and the Ontario Temperance Act.

Districts Nos. 4 and 6, for which no appointments have as yet been made, constitute No. 4, the counties of York, Simcoe, Ontario, Peel, Halton, Muskoka and Parry Sound, with Toronto as headquarters, and No. 6, the counties of Renfrew, Frontenac, Lanark, Leeds, Carleton, Greenville, Dundas, Russell, Prescott, Stormont and Glengarry, with Ottawa as headquarters.

The following, all returned soldiers and men with police experience, have been appointed to be constables on the Ontario provincial police force: Francis Gardner, Toronto; Harry Willmott, Welland; Fred R. Smythe, Toronto; James D. Proctor, Toronto; Frank B. Creasy, Welland. Their appointments take effect Nov. 27.

Provincial Constable Albert Ward has been appointed an inspector, with headquarters at Toronto; Provincial Officer James G. Jeffrey has been appointed an inspector of investigation.

License Inspector W. S. Blackwall has been appointed provincial inspector for law enforcement for Northern Ontario. His appointment rounds out the appointments of this particular nature, Inspectors Paxton and Elliott having already been appointed for similar duty in eastern and western Ontario. Inspector Blackwall's territory will be: Algoma, Temiskaming, Sudbury, Rainy River, Thunder Bay and Manitoulin Island.

Temporary Provincial Officer Arch. D. Angle has been appointed to the permanent staff.

Among the details of the proposed reorganization plan of the provincial police which have yet to receive government approval in the question of the numerical strength of the force. It is understood that this will be in the neighborhood of 350 men.

A petition to the Dominion Government in connection with a new dock at Mattagami landing is being circulated this week and is being signed by all to whom it is presented. This is a very necessary and desirable work and it is to be hoped that the Government gives prompt attention to this petition.

CHARGED WITH CONSPIRACY AFTER ABOUT THREE YEARS

In the police court on Thursday last S. T. Allary, an Austrian, was charged by John Russa with conspiracy, the case being remanded to this week by Magistrate Atkinson. The case is of more than passing interest. According to the complainant, John Russa, he was fined \$200.00 and costs about three years ago for having liquor in a public place. He claimed that the bottle produced as evidence did not belong to him and must have been "planted" on him. At the time the evidence was all against Russa and his story seemed no different from the other unsupported alibis put up by others in similar cases. Recently, however, from some correspondence coming to his notice Russa believes that he has discovered a conspiracy to get him in wrong in the matter of that bottle. He claims that he has found evidence to show that the bottle was "planted" all right, and so he has commenced the present case in order to clear his own name, to secure the return of the fine and costs and to have the guilty party punished.
