The Rochester claims adjoin the Hollinger on the west at the south corner of the big mine property.

**KING KIRKLAND COMPANY
INCREASES CAPITAL STOCK**

The special meeting of shareholders recently approved the by-laws to increase the capital stock of the King Kirkland Mines from two and a half million to five million shares, and to purchase the adjoining Ferguson property for 450,000 shares. The King Kirkland has spent about \$50,000.00 on development work, and has 3,070,000 shares in the treasury for future needs. The shaft is down 100 feet. Further equipment is being taken on to the property and it is understood enlarged development is planned.

**CARTWRIGHT TO RE-OPEN
AT PAINKILLER LAKE**

It is understood that plans are under way to resume operations at the Cartwright property in the Painkiller Lake section. A new shaft house is being built and the shaft to be re-timbered. The shaft is now down 100 feet.

**EXTENSIVE REPORT MADE
ON GOODFISH PROPERTY**

An extensive report has been completed recently on the Goodfish Gold Mines at Goodfish Lake by Mr. E. H. Orser, consulting mining engineer. Mr. Orser reports the definite determination of tellurides in the ore from No. 3 shaft. The Goodfish Mine has been the scene of quite a bit of development work during the summer. It is the intention to install a small mining plant and carry on a further aggressive development and exploration programme.

**EXCELLENT ADVICE FROM
THE NEW O.H.A. PRESIDENT**

In his annual address to the O.H.A. at Toronto on Saturday last, President Copeland, of Midland, among other things said:—"The new residence rule in the constitution eliminates the tourist, who in the past has been a pest to our Association. So important was this rule that the Canadian Amateur Hockey Association adopted it at their last annual meeting, which is proof of its value, and I must now congratulate the Executive on the firm stand they took on this matter, all for the betterment of the players and the O.H.A."

The president also paid a tribute to the work of Secretary Hewitt and Treasurer Paxton, and concluded as follows:

"Gentlemen, it is our ambition to make this the greatest and purest amateur organization in the world, but it is not for quantity, it is for quality we are striving. We must keep it clean; cleaner in the future than in the past. In expanding, keep clean what we have; keep out the doubtful players; keep them out until we know they are right, and it is you men that are here to-day that must see to it."

**APPEAL HOLDS SIR CHAS.
ROSS LIABLE FOR DEBTS**

On August 9th. this year, Mr. Justice Rose gave a judgment in which he found Sir Chas. Ross liable for goods sold and delivered to the Patricia Mine by the Northern Canada Supply Co. and the Taylor Hardware Co. The goods were sold on the strength of certain notes signed by one O'Connor who was doing exploration and development work on the property. This judgment was appealed by Sir Chas. Ross. Last week the case was argued before the Appeal Division Court and the judgment of this latter court, like that of the former court, that unless further appeal is taken to the Supreme Court, the present judgment would indicate that Sir Chas. Ross will have to pay the amounts involved.

At 9.15 on Friday evening last the Fire Brigade had a call to 85 spruce street, the alarm being sent in on account of a chimney blaze there. Three weeks previously there was a similar chimney blaze at the same residence, no damage being done in either case. On Friday evening, with the firemen right on the job, the chimney was allowed to burn out thoroughly, and was well cleaned out in this way so as to minimize further danger.
