These two issues of debentures are for sewers and waterworks, and the Council considered it was making an unusually good sale at the prices given. These prices are much better than secred for previous town debentures. The sale of these debentures is of special financial advantage to the town at this time. The Mayor in commenting upon the resolutions after they had been passed by the Council, said that if other local people would take up other town debentures it would place Timmins in good financial position for the year.
