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16,892 VOTED IN RECENT  
TEMISKAMING ELECTION

Mr. McDonald Has a Majority of 94  
Over Mr. McEachren, According  
to Official Figures.

The official figures for the Temiskaming riding in the recent Dominion  
General Elections have been made  
public. According to these official  
figures the vote in this riding was as  
follows:—

McDonald, 5797.  
McEachren, 5703.  
Keeney, 5130.  
Bertrand, 197.

There were many polling sub-divisions where there were no spoiled ballots, there being only 65 spoiled ballots reported for the whole riding.

The ballots counted, as given above for the four candidates, totalled 16,827, and counting with these the 65 ballots spoiled, the total vote cast in the recent election was 16,892.

The vote in the recent General Election was over 5000 more than in the by-election of 1920. In the latter (the by-election) the vote was as follows:—McDonald, 5293; Slaght, 3102; Pullen, 3060. McDonald's majority thus was 2,232 in the by-election. In the recent election he had 94 majority over his nearest opponent, Mr. McEachren. It will be noted that the increase in the vote polled went more largely to the Liberal and Conservative candidates than to the Farmer-Labour representative. In the recent election Mr. McDonald received only 504 more votes than in the by-election, while McEachren got 2601 more votes than polled for Slaght, and Mr. Kennedy 2070 more than Pullen's vote.

Although protest was made regarding the recent election here, and though the majority by which Mr. McDonald will take the seat is a comparatively small one, it is understood that the chances are practically all on the side of the present member retaining the seat for this parliament.

According to the official figures Mr. Bertrand polled more votes than he was generally credited with, coming

within three of getting a round 200. To save his deposit, however, he would have had to poll over 2700 more votes than he did. The deposit of \$200.00 required to be made by each candidate on Nomination Day is returned to the candidate after the election, provided said candidate polls one half of the total vote of the winning candidate. Despite the fact that many members of the present parliament have been elected by only small majorities, many, indeed, being under one hundred, there are more candidates than usual who will lose their deposits. This condition is largely due to there being three or more candidates contesting ridings where the vote went largely to two parties, leaving the third one with a small vote that was only an inconsiderable fraction of the vote for the winner.

The Southern songs were especially appreciated. One of the special numbers Wednesday evening was the saxophone duet by Mr. and Mrs. Alexander. IT COST HEAVILY TO  
OBSTRUCT THE POLICE.

At the police court on Thursday last Mr. and Mrs. Mike Latuski and Mr. J. Peters were shown that it is costly sometimes to interfere with the police in the carrying out of their duties as officers of the law. A few days ago the police made an unexpected visit to the premises of W. Peters on Fourth Avenue. The officers got their hands on some samples of what appeared to be unlawful liquid refreshments, and some of those in the house made a desperate effort to spoil the "evidence." They succeeded in breaking a jug said to contain "Oh-be-joyful," but Chief Greer hung like grim death to a glass with enough "evidence" in it to make a good case against W. Peters, the owner of the premises. Peters on Thursday was fined \$200.00 and costs for illegally having liquor in a public place. Mike Latuski was fined \$100 and costs for obstructing the police in the performance of their duties. Mr. Latuski was fined \$50.00 and costs, and Mrs. J. Peters \$10.00 and costs for the same offence, obstructing the police. They all duly paid up.

The charge of attempted rape against M. Hern was reduced to a charge of indecent assault. The accused on his latter charge was committed for trial before a judge, bail being allowed in the sum of \$1000.00.

In addition to the three men committed for trial in connection with the death of the foreigner at St. Joseph's last week, the other cases before the Magistrate were plain drunks, with one disorderly as a slight variation. The latter was Mike Sedourik who was fined \$10.00 and costs. There were five drunks, all foreigners, who were each fined \$10.00 and costs. During the holiday season the police were lenient with those who did not disturb the peace and who could stand without falling too often, and move along homeward. The six fined were beyond even such leniency and had to be "picked up," some of them literally so. The Magistrate, however, also had the holiday spirit of leniency and they all escaped with the holiday fine of \$10.00 and costs.

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
