FINAL STEPS IN PURCHASE OF THE ROCHESTER CLAIMS

Reports, apparently well-founded, are to the effect that the Nipissing Mining Co., of Cobalt, has practically completed the purchase of the Rochester claims adjoining the Hollinger. The price of the claims is said to be in the neighborhood of a quarter of a million dollars. The Nipissing have had the Rochester claims under option for some months past, during which time diamond drilling has been carried on, a number of holes being put down. Evidently this diamond drilling has shown promising results, just as most people hereabouts, believed it would. The purchase of the Rochester claims by the Nipissing will be followed no doubt by an aggressive plan of exploration and development of the property. Some believe that active mining work will be under way on the property inside the next month or six weeks. This would mean that Timmins would have another active mine under development and with ample capital to assure its full development.

HOTEL DE GREER VERY WELL PATRONIZED THIS WEEK

Last week's police court was an unusually small one, there being only a couple of cases before Magistrate Atkinson. One of these was a simple drunk, with the benediction of the usual ten and costs. The other was the wind-up of the conspiracy charge in which one foreigner accused another of "framing" him by "planting" liquor in his room and having him fined accordingly for displeasing the Hon. Mr. Raney. The occurrence took place two or three years ago and in the case last week the complainant was not able to substantiate his charges and the case was accordingly dismissed. If the police court last week was a

slim one, this week's court of justice promises to be an unusually busy one. This week the famous Hotel de Greer has been full up all the time, with guests coming and going, but chiefly coming. Sunday evening Chief Greer and his gallant band gathered in no less than seven husky customers at one collection. The seven men were somewhat spiffed and they had one big foreigner down in the snow and were decorating him but not for bravery in the face of the enemy. The guy who was down was shouting "murder" in such a loud voice that a crowd quickly gathered believing it must be another evangelist struck town. The gang didn't put up half as good a fight against the police as they did against the big foreigner down in the snow. They were all locked up, some later getting out on bail and others preferring the excellent bill of fare at the Hotel de Greer. Another man to face Magistrate Atkinson tomorrow will be Fred Pencubuk. Fred and his brother, George, had a little disagreement and both were more or less beautifully butchered. One needed twelve stitches and the other eight to hold them together after the fraternization. Officer Rayercroft apparently does not hold the general opinion that it is unkind to interfere in a family dispute. In any case he went to work and arrested the said Fred and charged him with being drunk, a further charge of fighting being likely to be added. "If these foreigners want to kill each other, they must do it quietly and not disturb the sabbath," is evidently a motto of Constable Rayercroft's.

BULGARIAN ARRESTED ON HIGH-GRADING CHARGE

Alex Adjison, a Bulgarian living in Moneta, was placed under arrest on Sunday evening about 9 o'clock and will face a charge of illegally having gold ore in his possession. He will come before Magistrate Atkinson on Thursday of this week. Adjison has been working at the Hollinger for a short time and in some way or another attracted the special interest of Officer R. Allen. As a result of this special interest, Adjison's home in Moneta was searched Sunday evening by Officer Allen and Constable Rayercroft. In the mattress of one of the beds a quantity of gold ore was found. Adjison's explanation was that he had gotten the gold ore at the Dome Mines, but his explanation was scarcely satisfactory to Officer Allen who is this week giving Adjison opportunity to explain to Magistrate Atkinson as to how he came to have the gold ore and why he used a mattress as a jewel case.
