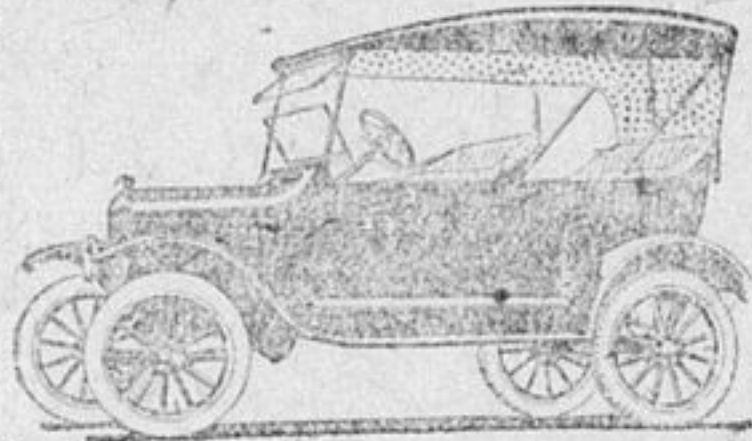

INSPECTOR MOORE TO BE TRANSFERRED TO SOUTH

Head of Provincial Police in District To Have Charge of Group of Southern Counties.

There seems to be rather general disapproval of the announcement that Provincial Police Inspector Walter Moore is to be transferred from the North Land to Southern Ontario. All in Temiskaming and adjacent districts would be pleased at any promotion or advancement of the officer in question as he has made an enviable name for himself for efficiency, honesty, courtesy and ability. While in charge of the Porcupine district he performed his duties with such sincerity and capability as to make all good citizens his friends. Some months ago he was transferred to Cobalt and given charge of all Temiskaming as Inspector of Provincial Police for the District. Last November he was given further advancement being appointed Inspector of an enlarged district, including Temiskaming, Sudbury, Nipissing, Manitoulin Island, and Algoma. He has been working hard and effectively to organize his district, and his good work has attracted general attention. Following his representations to the Department new Provincial Police Officers have been appointed at Porcupine Junction, Hearst, Sioux, Lookout, South Porcupine and Cochrane. There is also to be an officer appointed with headquarters at Timmins for the Mattagami and other outlying districts. Inspector Moore has the happy faculty of being able to work in harmony with the local police all through his big district and this gives a double effectiveness to his work. Now, it is proposed to take him away from this district. According to information given out last week he has been appointed Inspector of Provincial Police for the counties of Waterloo, Perth, Dufferin, Huron, Wellington and Grey, with headquarters at Kitchener, Ont. No doubt the authorities consider him a valuable man and needed for the district referred to. But he is a doubly valuable man for the North Land, his experience and success here and the general esteem in which he is held being factors that should be considered.

ROUTE OF T. & N. O. ON TO TIN CAN PORTAGE, ETC.

The following is a summary of the official description of the area north of Cochrane to be covered by the extension of the T. & N. O. Railway.
From Cochrane the road will run north through Glackmeyer and Blount Townships, crossing the Abitibi and its tributary, the Sucker river. Then turning to the west the railway will cross Jawbone Creek and then Trappers creek and follow along the east bank of the Abitibi river for a few miles. Then below the Carrying Places the railway will cross to the west bank. Then at a distance three or four miles west of the river it runs roughly parallel the river, almost due north, to Burntwood portage, which is a few miles above New Post.

With the exception of the river crossings, the route selected will make construction easy. The grades are moderate and the cuts mostly clay. Good agricultural land, liberally supplied with lime from the Pateozie rocks to the north, will be traversed for the greater part of the distance. The rivers crossed will be advantageously used in bringing out pulpwood from large areas.

The rocks underlying the area are Archean. The clay covering is very thick and rock-exposures are few. Description of the rock exposures and of the clays will be found in a report recently published by the Ontario Department of Mines, "The Abitibi and Mattagami Rivers." This report by J. G. Cross, M. Y. Williams and Joseph Keele is accompanied by a map of a large area. Copies of the report may be obtained on application to the Department of Mines, Toronto.
