PREPARATIONS FOR DOG RACE SOON UNDER WAY

It is expected that the organization and preparations for the annual Porcupine Dog Race will be under full swing in a few days. Last year the Board of Trade co-operated in making a success of the event and it is likely that the same active assistance will be given this year. There is a growing disposition to follow the suggestion of building a big Winter Carnival around the Dog Race and having an event that would be an outstanding Winter Sports affair and a noteworthy advertisement for the Camp. It is, of course, too late now to arrange for a Winter Carnival this year, but the general opinion seems to be that the Dog Race should be held as in past years and immediately after the event is over organization should be perfected for a big Winter Carnival next year. Such an event, in addition to being a local entertainment feature, would attract crowds from far and near, just as a similar event in the Pas, Manitoba, each year arouses the widest interest and attention.

This year there seem to be more than the usual number of dog teams in this district, and accordingly the annual dog race should be keenly contested and interesting. The event will likely be held towards the end of next month. There is a handsome silver cup, donated last year by Dr. McInnis for competition in this event, to be won three years before becoming the property of the winner. Last year Mr. W. Martin's team won the race and the trophy for the race. Mr. Martin was also the winner of the handsome silver shield donated by Mr. A. R. Globe as the trophy for the Dog Race when it was first inaugurated. The 1922 Race will be the seventh annual Dog Race here.

INTERMEDIATE GAME AT THE FALLS POSTPONED

The Intermediate game between Iron-quois Falls and Timmins, scheduled to be played at the Falls on Saturday, Jan. 28th, has been postponed by agreement, and will be played on Feb. 17th. The Timmins boys found that having the game on Saturday evening meant the loss of at least two shifts, as they would not be able to get back here until Sunday evening. By having the game on any other day than Saturday this loss could be considerably reduced and accordingly the Falls when communicated with in regard to the matter agreed to the postponement of the match. Contrary to the line in a North Bay newspaper, this game has not been defaulted. The Timmins Intermediates are playing out the schedule in fairness to Cochrane and the Falls, though not in line for any honours.

ANOTHER RUMOR OF HOPE FOR A NEW DISTRICT JAIL

Every once in twice as often there is a rumor that a new district jail will be built at Haileybury to accommodate the growing needs of Temiskaming. If Temiskaming has not yet been given the very much needed new jail, this district is always having hopes along that line handed out. The latest suggestion of hope is thus referred to by The Haileyburian in its last week's issue:—

"Inspector of Prisons, W. W. Dimplop, accompanied by Mr. Fairburn, Deputy Minister of Public Works looked over the proposed site for the new District Jail, on Broadway street, on Monday afternoon. While no official statement regarding their decision was issued it is understood that they favored the site. It is ideal for the purpose, being on the same grounds as the District Court House and Registry Office. The Board of Trade which has been active in past years in endorsing the recommendations of countless Grand Juries to the effect that a jail be erected in Haileybury, as the County Seat of Temiskaming, to serve the needs of the district, has handed the matter over to the Town Council. President McCuaig of the Board of Trade states that it is understood work on the jail will be commenced in the early part of the summer."

According to officials on the T. & N. O. Railway the Christmas traffic was as heavy or heavier than previous years.

FANCY DRESS CARNIVAL AT RINK MONDAY NIGHT

There will be a Fancy Dress Carnival at the Timmins Rink on Monday evening of next week, Jan. 30th, under the auspices of the St. Anthony's Altar Girls' Society. The auspices under which the event is held is guarantee that arrangements will be well made and a pleasing evening assured. There will be a number of very interesting events, including a half-mile race for men. There will be a fine list of good prizes. Timmins Citizens' Band will be in attendance and furnish the best of music for the occasion. The admission fee for the evening is set at the nominal rate of half a dollar. The Fancy Dress Carnival on Monday evening should be a pleasing and successful event.

BUT THERE'S STILL MUCH "FISHY" ABOUT THE GOVT.

It is understood that the Ontario Government has decided to go out of the business of handling fish. Ontario Government fish was sold throughout the Province, often at very reduced rates. Some of this fish was sold in Timmins and was looked upon by many as one of the two ways of beating the high cost of living, the other way being to bump up against the high cost of drying. In an announcement made last week by Hon. Harry Mills, the locomotive engineer who has charge of the Ontario Department of Mining, the statement is made that the Ontario Government has decided to discontinue the fish sales branch of the Game and Fisheries department. Representatives along this line have been made by fishermen for a considerable period and in resolving to go out of the fish business, the government has been chiefly actuated by the views that the establishment of this branch was a war measure intended to encourage people to buy fish at a time when meat was scarce, that it was found difficult to control the supply, and also by the fact that representations were made by fishermen all over the province that the Government was interfering with their sales by underselling them.
