PORCUPINE PLAYS AT IROQUOIS FALLS TO-NIGHT

Falls Plays Here next Wednesday Evening in the N.O.H.A. Senior Series.

The Porcupine Hockey team is scheduled to play this (Wednesday) evening at Iroquois Falls in the N.O.H.A. Senior Series. The Porcupine team has to win this game to have a chance in the group and the boys are going down with that idea in mind. They are going over to the Falls with the determination to pull out a victory.

So far as Porcupine team is concerned there are only four more games to play, two at home and two away. Tonight Porcupine plays at the Falls and on Saturday at New Liskeard. The home games are:—Iroquois Falls here on Wednesday, Feb. 8th, and New Liskeard here on Tuesday, Feb. 14th.

Iroquois Falls is now well ahead in the race for honours having won 7 games, lost 1, and four to play, two with Porcupine and two with Liskeard home and home in each case.

Liskeard has tied one game and lost 7, with four to play, two with Timmins and two with the Falls, each home and home.

The Porcupine team has won 4, tied one, lost 3, and has four games to play, two with Liskeard and two with the Falls, each home and home.

To tie with Iroquois Falls, the Porcupine team has to win every game in the schedule to be played. If the Porcupine loses any one of the four games then this team is automatically out of the running. If the Porcupine team wins all the four games the tie with Liskeard will have to be played off, if it affects the result. If Liskeard should win a game from the Falls it would help the chances of the Porcupine, but as in other years and other sports, the contest seems to be altogether one between the Falls and the Porcupine, with the Falls for once at least having the edge on the chances. However, the Falls will have to earn its victories and the Porcupine will not be defeated until the season is over. The boys are in good hopes that a strong finish will reverse the standing made by the favourable commencement of the Falls. In any case it may be taken for granted that the remaining games in the N.O.H.A. Senior Series will be mighty keen and closely-contested matches and well worthy of bumper crowds.

PASSENGER SERVICE ON THE NATIONAL RAILWAYS

A new schedule for passenger trains on the Canadian National Railways went into effect on Jan. 15th. The only change in the service of the "Continental Limited" is the departure from Winnipeg of the Eastbound at 11.00 a.m., the old schedule being 10.50 a.m. The passenger service between Cochrane and Quebec is tri-weekly, leaving Cochrane 1.20 p.m. on Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays, and from Quebec 5.00 p.m. same days.

FALLS NEEDED OVERTIME TO WIN FROM NEW LISKEARD

The first game last week between the Falls and Liskeard at New Liskeard resulted last Thursday in a win for the Falls, but not until ten minutes overtime had been played. At the end of the third period, despite the most strenuous efforts of Iroquois Falls the score stood 4 all. The game throughout was a very fast one and Liskeard seemed to have the edge on the play all the way through the game proper. Liskeard did the first scoring. The first period ended one all. The goal tending of Elliott was a feature of the game, the Liskeard guardian adding to his growing reputation. Of course, Corbould in goal for the Falls was right on the job as usual, and had it not been for his clever and experienced work the score might have been much different. In the second period Liskeard also started the scoring getting in two, while the Falls only score once, making it 3 to 2 in favour of Liskeard. In the third period Quesnell tied the score for the Falls, but Thompson put New Liskeard ahead again. Liskeard, thus in the lead, trying "stalling" tactics, might have gotten away with the game, but Chircoski and Quesnell after some pretty combination work, slipped in the goal that tied. In the necessary overtime the visitors went at it desperately and slammed in three scores, thus winning the game. Liskeard's team is somewhat crippled or the result might have been different. The crowd at the game was the largest to get out at Liskeard this year and the Liskeard boys were very properly cheered for their good work. Quesnell and Ffuker are counted as the pick of the Falls team, with Brydge and Wilson making a heavy defence to pass. For Liskeard the stars were Spence and Thompson, both of whom, however, got a rather rough passage from the heavyweights on the Paper Town team.

In the Junior N.O.H.A. there are two more games to play—home and home—as follows:—Feb. 8th, (Wednesday) Timmins at Iroquois Falls, and Feb. 15th, (Wednesday) Iroquois Falls at Timmins. At present it looks as if Iroquois Falls was fated this year to win all championships in hockey,—Senior, Intermediates, Junior, Ladies and High School League. Of course, they win none of them until the season is completed and you can never tell. But in all the different leagues the Falls has a nice lead now and everything goes nicely with the Paper Town players. Oh, well, the Falls deserves to win one year, anyhow, for they have in past years taken defeats in the right sort of spirit and always staged a good "come-back." But the Senior N.O.H.A. is one championship they must expect to put up a desperate fight for, and likely lose it at that in the end.

In the Junior series the Falls have a dandy team of husky fellows who show up well and evidence the effect of good coaching. The team has it all over the Timmins team in the matter of weight and though Timmins put up a very hard battle in the last match here the locals were outclassed by the visitors. However, the victory is never complete until the season is over, and the season is only half close now. Timmins Juniors have only to win the next two games to tie with the Falls. In any case the Falls will have to work for the Junior championship.

WANT CHANGE IN T. & N. O. RY. ROUTE NEAR NORTH BAY

The Citizens' Unemployment Committee of North Bay has forwarded the following resolution to Hon. E. C. Drury, Premier of Ontario, urging immediate attention and action in the matter. The petition reads as follows:—

"To the Honorable E. C. Drury, Prime Minister of Ontario and all Cabinet Ministers and others who are co-operating to relieve unemployment. Your petitioners humbly urge that special efforts be made at once to develop the power resources of Northern Ontario. Your petitioners humbly point out the Power shortage in North Bay, and pray for full consideration at the present moment in the matter of the French River Development. Your petitioners humbly urge that the right of way along the line of deviation from Mileage thirty-five to North Bay on the Temiskaming and Northern Ontario Railway be cut out this winter and immediately if possible."

For a democratic country, there may be a little too much of the "humbly urge" business in the petition thus directed to a "servant of the people," but that may be a form that may make special appeal to the Farmers' Government. However, the purposes of the petition deserve every consideration on their merits. The unemployment situation is much more serious than most people up this way realize. The Porcupine Camp has practically escaped the unemployment menace so far, but Cobalt, North Bay and other towns served by the T. & N. Railway have been seriously affected.

If the Ontario Government had looked properly at the power question some months ago, a great part of the unemployment would have been relieved ere this time. Even now, something may be done by the Government to help matters along. It seems now to be decidedly up to the Government.
