FALLS WIN AGAIN IN A STRENUOUS GAME 9-4

Porcupine Lost Out at Iroquois Falls Last Week on Soft Ice.

A couple of hundred fans from Timmins and district went over last Wednesday evening by special train to Iroquois Falls to see the Senior N.O.H.A. game, Porcupine vs the Falls. The final score was 9 to 4 in favour of the Falls. The ice was soft, and this was a handicap to the Porcupine team, the boys not being able to get going until well on in the game. At the end of the second period, for instance, the score stood 7 for the Falls and 0 for Porcupine. In the last period, however, Frank McGuire got two and Cameron two. If the boys had been going all through as they did in the last period, the score would have been much different.

In the first period, the Falls seemed to have the edge on the play, Quennell scoring twice and Flucker once in this period. Early in the game "Duke" McCurry was injured and had to stay off most of the game. This was naturally a serious handicap to the Porcupine team as "Duke" is a clever and speedy worker every minute he is in the play. The first period also had its ill-luck for the Falls, Brydge being retired. He made what appeared to be a very wicked head-on attack upon Frank McGuire. The referee skated over apparently to penalize Brydge, but he was out of action. His lip was badly lacerated and several of his teeth broken, his mouth having run against the end of Frank's stick. Brydge had to retire for surgical attention. He came back again later, however, and was loudly cheered by the Falls. In this period the referees insisted on counting a goal that Goal Umpire R. Wilson positive-

ly asserted was not scored. Mr. Wilson was replaced, and the officials who were half way down the ice, but said they saw the goal, counted it for the Falls.

In the second period Porcupine worked hard to upset the 3-0 score against them, but they had no luck. This period closed with Porcupine without a score and the Falls with seven counted. Combination work by the Falls players featured this period. In the third spasm, the Porcupines began to bristle, and there was some fast work, though the play was cleaner, only two penalties being handed out. Clever combination and individual work by McGuire and Cameron secured four counts for Porcupine, each of these players tallying. Both Brennan and Campbell gave Corbould some tough work to do, but he was there all right. Scully also had his work cut out for him, being fairly bombarded at times. He was left time and again without the assistance of a defence but he did some wonderful work. Despite the appearance of the score, Scully played a rattling good game and it was not his fault by any means that the game was lost. He showed a quickness and cleverness as a goaler that delighted the crowd. Time and again the Falls fans joined in the cheering when he stopped ones that looked sure ones.

Porcupine was under some handicaps, one of them being that "Duke" McCurry, always a consistent worker for the team, was not fully recovered from injuries received at the Falls last week and was only in the game part of the time. New Liskeard had the best of the play in the first period, which was rather slow, but the Porcupine boys got going in the second half and were strong in the third period. Those seeing the game are agreed in special praise for Joe Brennan's hard work all through the game. He showed up great in back-checking, in stealing passes and breaking up Liskeard combinations and he was a worry to the Farmers' team all the time.
