JUDGMENT IN FAVOUR OF
NORTHERN CANADA POWER

In the Osgoode Hall reports on Saturday last the following paragraph appears:—

"Trial—Before Middleton, J.—Hollinger Consolidated Gold Mines Ltd. v. Northern Canada Power Co. Ltd., et al.—D. L. McCarthy, K.C., and J. Y. Murdoch, for plaintiffs, W. Nesbitt, K.C., W. N. Tilley, K.C., and R. S. Robertson, K.C., for defendants. Action to recover damages stated at \$1,837,558.76 by reason of failure of defendants to supply the necessary electric energy for the operation of the mine, resulting in a partial closing and reduced output, and secondly, on account of alleged overcharges by reason of failure of defendants to give them the benefit of reduced rates, said to have been given to another company and which, under terms of agreement in question, it is said should have enured to plaintiffs' benefit. Judgment: Action dismissed with costs. Thirty days' stay."

SCIENCE AND SUPPER;
LECTURE, 'MATTER IN MOTION'
