New York Newspaper Reports New Record Made by Local Wireless Expert.

The Westinghouse Wireless phone station located at Newark, New Jersey, U.S.A. recently received a report from Mr. M. J. Caveney, who is with the Northern Canada Power Company at Sandy Falls, that the musical programmes and speech broadcasted daily from their station, was being received very clearly at Sandy Falls.

The Westinghouse Manufacturing company originally estimated that their Newark station was only capable of radiating the voice and music a distance of 300 miles, but the daily reception at Sandy Falls creates a long distance record for the Newark station.

The Publicity Department of the Westinghouse Co. evidently appreciated the fact to the extent of publishing the report of Mr. Caveney in the New York Globe & Commercial Advertiser of February 7th.

As a consequence Mr. Caveney has received numerous requests from wireless fans in various parts of the States, for details as to class of instruments used and general construction of his receiving set.
