## Timmins and District Notes

(Mr. Robt. Elgie, travelling freight and passenger agent of the Canadian National and Grand Trunk Railways, with headquarters at North Bay, was a visitor to Timmins on business connected with the railways this week.)

Another Schroeder Orchestra Concert will be given early in March. The concert given some weeks ago by the Schroeder Orchestras was so outstanding a success and attracted so large a crowd that the success of the coming event is practically assured.

On account of the Soo-Falls game on Saturday of this week, the proposed visit here of the Cochrane Intermediate Hockey team and the Cochrane ladies hockey team has been postponed. The new date will be announced as soon as known.

Dr. L. Gagnon, V.S., who has conducted a veterinary practice at Haileybury for about 15 years past, and who has also had a practice of considerable size in Timmins and district during the last few years, will move to Cochrane about the first of March.
