**GREATER CONCERN URGED IN MINING DEVELOPMENT**

**President of Mining Institute Points Out How the People may Benefit By Intelligent Thought of Governments.**

At the Canadian Institute of Mining and Metallurgy convention last week the President touched on the need for a deeper and more intelligent interest by the Governments in mining matters. He proved that such interest would not only be better for the mining industry, but it would also be of very great benefit to the country at large. Referring to the President's address, The Toronto Mail & Empire says editorially:—

The president of the Canadian Institute of Mining and Metallurgy has urged a greater concern by the Government for the development of mining in Canada. There is, as he points out, a Continent of mineralized pre-Cambrian formation in Northern Ontario and Quebec and Manitoba. Even on the Mackenzie River, iron ore, coal, oil and tar sands can be found almost adjoining. We have about 400,000,000 acres of arable agricultural land, but we have four times as much timber or mineral area. Agriculture now covers only 15 per cent. of the country, and half of the balance is mineralized in some way.

In Ontario during 1921 were produced gold, silver, platinum, copper, nickel, cobalt, lead and iron ore, as well as molybdenum and other minerals. The year was not a good one, except for the gold producers, for markets for silver, copper, nickel, lead and other metals were slack in sympathy with the general commodity trend. But at that, Ontario had a general production valued at \$54,000,000, and British Columbia was second with \$35,000,000. The water-powers of Northern Ontario are splendidly situated to enable the building up of great mining industries outside of the present camps at Cobalt, Porcupine, Kirkland Lake and Sudbury. As soon as commercial conditions revive, Northern Ontario ought to have as much vigor in mining generally as is now shown in the record operations of the gold mines. What are the drawbacks? For gold there is an unlimited market, and only the need of more power development at present stands in the way of enlargement. More capital is needed to test new properties. Silver, nickel and other mining industries needs a revival of market values. In these metals, there is big competition from the United States, which also has great producers, highly capitalized. On Belcher Island in James Bay, for instance, there are remarkably rich iron ore deposits, easily accessible from the water, and waiting only for transportation and power to make a stir in the iron world. The Moose Mountain and other iron ore deposits cannot apparently yet be handled successfully in competition with the Mesaba range ores.

Compared with the market value of agricultural products, or even of lumbering, Canadian mining is a lesser factor in our business. But an industry that can turn out \$200,000,000 worth of metals or minerals, and can employ the type of immigrants whom we are likely to receive in thousands in the next few years, is a great asset. Southern Ontario and Quebec can obtain important commercial assets from adequate utilization of northern mining possibilities. What Cobalt did for many Toronto persons fifteen years ago, the whole North country can do for Southern Canada, if an intelligent, persistent encouragement to mining is not denied.

**DIAMOND DRILLING SOON TO START ALONG MATTAGAMI**

Mr. Hugh Roberts and a staff of men are in town this week, and it is likely that the work of diamond drilling on the properties recently optioned along the Mattagami River will be commenced at an early date. Mr. Roberts represents Minneapolis interests, and has secured options from the settlers up and down the river covering a stretch of several miles. The options give the rights to prospect for minerals on the farms in question. In case minerals are found the property required is purchased at the price mentioned in the option, the land remaining in the ownership of the settler concerned. The syndicate purchases wood, etc., from the settlers as may be required, and also builds any roads necessary across the properties. Operations will be carried on without interfering in any way with the ordinary work of the settlers.

The day after the Iroquois Falls team clipped the Greyhounds' claws, Mayor Douglas, of the Soo, wired to Jack Vanier in connection with the bet that Jack had made with him of our paper mill against their steel plant. Mayor Douglas' telegram was very short but very satisfactory. It was "Am shipping the steel plant today."

**HOPES CONTINUE FOR RE-OPENING OF MONETA**

Although lacking any official confirmation, the reports continue to the effect that big financial interests are likely to secure control of the Moneta Mine and that active work on the property is likely in the near future. The activity of the stock on the market recently shows how general is the belief in there being "something" in the current reports. The Moneta Mine comprises 120 acres alongside the Hollinger to the west. Only a limited amount of work has been done on the Moneta. The shaft is down 120 feet, with about 500 feet of underground workings. The work done showed ore with free gold and other promising indications.
