SUGGEST BASEBALL LEAGUE TO COVER ALL OF NORTH

Baseball next! Plans are already under way in several of the towns of the North Land for better baseball this summer. Iroquois Falls, for one, is quietly at work already looking to its baseball laurels. There is a general belief that the Temiskaming Baseball League which gave so much good sport last summer to New Liskeard, Cobalt, Haileybury and Englehart, will again hold forth this year. On the other hand, however, there are said to be some enthusiastic baseball fans who want the whole North covered by the one baseball league. One such fan proposed last week to The Northern News, of Cobalt, the formation of a league comprising at least Timmins, Iroquois Falls, New Liskeard, Cobalt and North Bay. He argued that with such a combination much more exciting sport would be witnessed and the race for the championship of the North would be a real affair. This proposal has been made in various forms in previous years, but it seems impractical. The distances in this big North are too great and the difficulties of travel too costly. From present indications it would appear that last year's plan of a district league to comprise Iroquois Falls, Cobalt and Timmins, seems the only practical way. If a league were formed to cover the whole North, it would be necessary to play the schedules in groups as is done in hockey, the champions of the groups to play off at the end of the season. The distance between the various towns concerned makes anything else impractical.

SUDBURY PAPER WANTS SMALLER N.O.H.A. EXECUTIVE

The following is an editorial comment from the last issue of The Sudbury Star:—
"The impenetrable haze which has enveloped the N.O.H.A. junior situation for the past two weeks having lifted slightly, it has become quite evident to every intelligent hockey supporter in the North that the executive of the Association is much too large for practical purposes. We have had protest after protest raining in upon the powers that be and we find an unwieldy executive with members scattered all over the North Country called upon to render eleventh-hour decisions, by telephone, by telegraph and too often without any chance to deal with the respective cases on their merits. This difficulty was not unforeseen last fall when the N.O.H.A. held its annual meeting and efforts were made at that time, sponsored by members of the Sudbury Hockey Club, to centralize the executive in order that the business of the Association could be carried on efficiently. The idea was not followed out and we have seen the result. The N.O.H.A. is not "done for" as a result of this season's junior debacle as some have stated. Hockey in the North must be upon an organized basis with any hope of success and it is too much to think that an infant organization can weather the first few years without making mistakes. The mistakes of this year will undoubtedly be of great value in serving to outline the straight and narrow course which must be followed in subsequent seasons if we are to be assured of clean, honest, amateur junior hockey in the territory covered by the N.O.H.A. One thing is certain. The executive as it stands now is too large, there is too much laxity in the appointment of representatives and there has been altogether too much lobbying on this account during the past season. Three men, one representative from each group, should be able to run the N.O.H.A."

FOREIGNER GETS SIX MONTHS FOR ASSAULTING WIFE.

At the police court on Thursday last Magistrate Atkinson sentenced Steve Kusuk to six months imprisonment for assaulting his wife. Steve thus has half a year to think the matter over and arrive at the conclusion that in this country it is not considered good form to beat up your better half.
