REPORTED THAT KEORA TO RESUME NEXT MONTH.

Among the persistent rumors "on street" is one to the effect that the Keora will resume development work next month. It is said that finances have been satisfactorily arranged to provide for an extensive campaign of development and that April will see the work well under way.

GOOD SHOWINGS ON "RED DOG," NIGHT HAWK LAKE.

Work on the "Red Dog" property east of Gold Island in the Night Hawk Lake, shows very encouraging results. A quartz vein of pleasing width and showing good values has been opened up and other exploration work indicates much promise for the property. The "Red Dog" property is owned by Mr. Dan O'Connor, of Connaught, who has had considerable exploration work done on the claims. Results so far have suggested the general promising prospects of the Night Hawk Lake area.

THERE ARE ADVANTAGES IN THE PRESENT SYSTEM.

The Saint Ste. Marie Star is conducting a campaign against the idea of the champions of the Northern Ontario Hockey Association having to play off first with the O.H.A. Intermediates in the Allan Cup contests. Perhaps from the sentimental standpoint, it might be argued that there is a reflection cast upon the N.O.H.A. Senior champions in thus classing them with the O.H.A. Intermediates. But each year the N.O.H.A. Champions have proven that they outclass the O.H.A. Intermediates. This year, for example, Iroquois Falls proved that it was away ahead of Kitchener's class. On the other hand the present arrangement has its advantages from a practical standpoint. The team that goes down to Toronto from the North finds the Arena a strange sheet of ice. Members of teams from the North will admit that for a few minutes they felt more or less lost on the Arena ice. It was something new to them. For the first game it was an advantage to be pitted against a team below their class. When they went up against the Senior O.H.A. team they were accustomed to the ice and could give a good account of themselves. The game with the Intermediates is simply a nice practice for the Northerners and gives an opportunity to become accustomed to the Arena without any particular danger. Until "home and home" games can be arranged, the present system seems to be the fairest possible. The extra game, practically speaking does not appear to be any serious handicap. That at any rate seems to be the standpoint taken by the players on the champion teams from the North. The Iroquois Falls team, this year's champions of the N.O.H.A., take this view, the Broke Hustler, Iroquois Falls' own newspaper, being quite frank about it.

PROGRESS IN FINANCING BY THE THOMPSON-KRIST.

It is understood that the Thompson Krist interests are meeting with satisfactory success in raising finances to meet their obligations in connection with the Northtown merger. On account of the failure of the Thompson-Krist to hold up its end of the deal the merged property closed down last year until the matter could be adjusted. It is believed now that the Thompson-Krist will soon have sufficient finances to carry out its part of the bargain, and this will no doubt mean the early resumption of operations at the Northtown.

INSPECTOR WALTER MOORE TO REMAIN IN THE NORTH.

Word was received here last week to the effect that the threatened removal of Provincial Inspector Walter Moore from this part of the North would not take place. Inspector W. Moore who won such an enviable reputation for his good work while stationed in the Porcupine, was appointed the Inspector for Temiskaming some months ago. In this enlarged sphere his talents won special attention and the result was that it was announced some weeks ago that he was to be transferred to Kitchener to take over charge of an enlarged district there. This announcement caused a decided protest from the North Land. It was pointed out to the authorities at Toronto that Inspector Moore knew the North Land; that he had given most satisfactory services here, and that any new man could not as satisfactorily take over this district. Various public bodies as well as private individuals and the press joined in the protest against the transference of so valued an officer. The protests apparently did the work desired, and last week announcement was made by Gen. H. M. Elliott, Commissioner of Ontario Police, that a new inspectorial district, to be known as No. 7, and to include Temiskaming, had been created, and Inspector Moore placed in charge. Inspector Storey will remain at Sudbury where there has been strenuous opposition also to his proposed removal from there.

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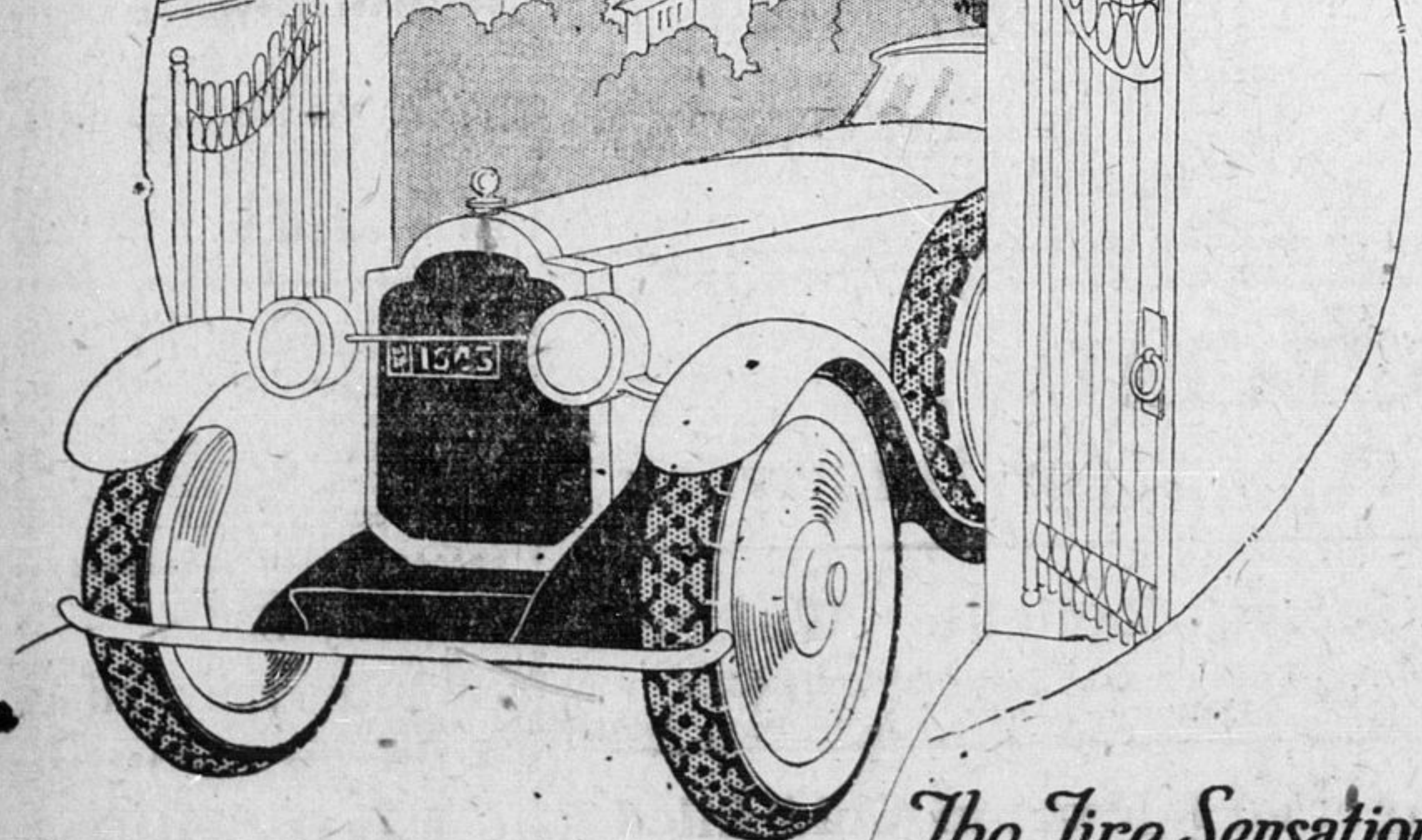
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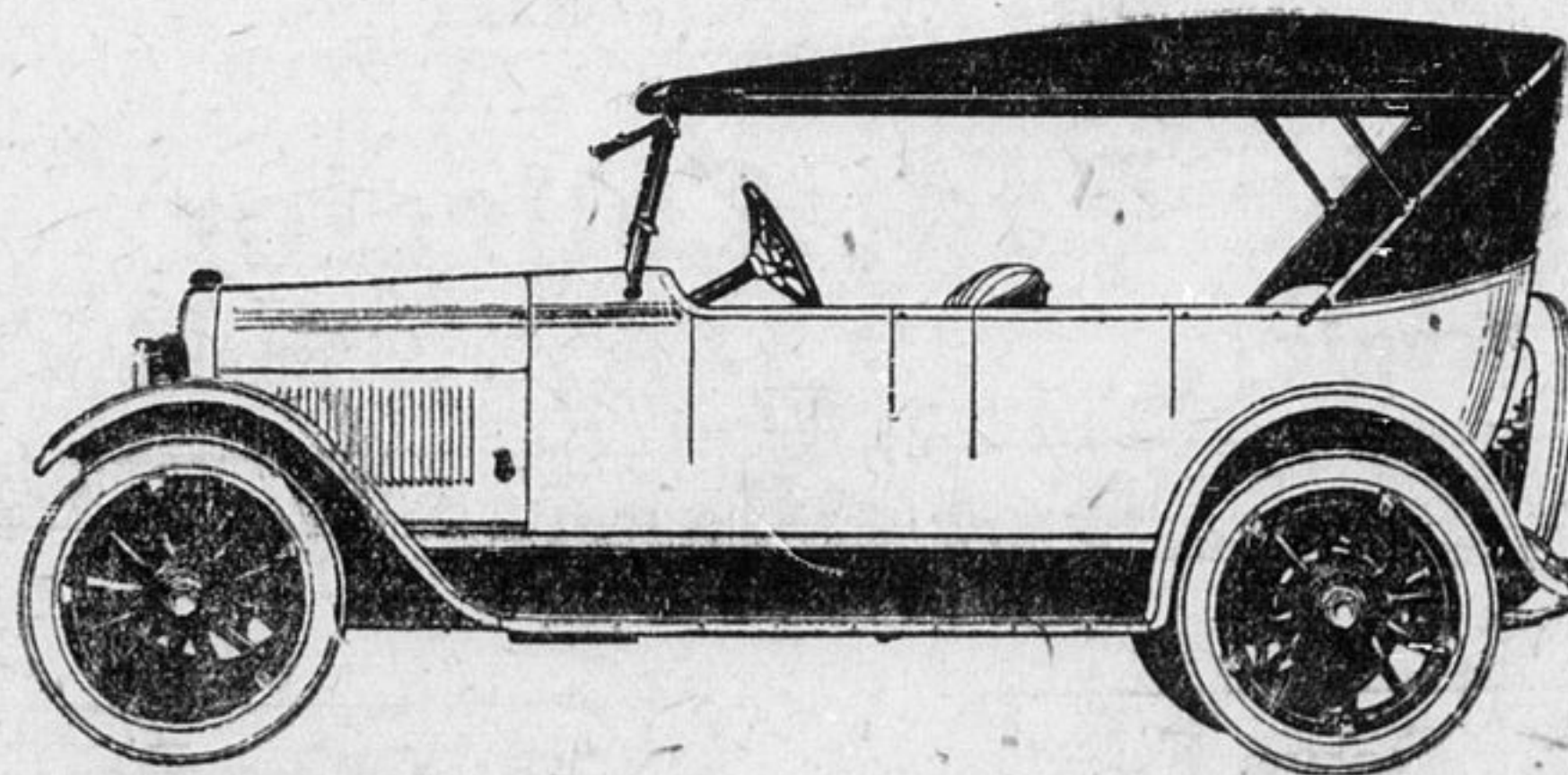


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
