LONDON, ENGLAND, MAIL ON "PROGRESS OF PORCUPINE"

The following article from The London Daily Mail, of London, England, indicates the growing interest in this district by financiers and others over "across the pond." The article shows a very intelligent conception of the situation,—a conception that makes some of the comment from nearer places seem very inept. There may be some who will maintain that the Davidson is not "the most important" of the developed but not yet producing mines, but all will be ready to give the Davidson a prominent place. Also it may be remarked that figuring mill capacity the way the article does, it may be said that the Hollinger has a mill "capable of crushing at the rate of about 1,500,000 tons per annum," which, of course is another and more imposing way, perhaps, of saying the capacity is over 4,000 tons per day.

"Comparatively few people on this side of the water appreciate the great strides that Canada has made as a gold-producing country during the past ten years, that Canada now rank third amongst British Colonies producing gold or that it is the only country the gold output of which has increased during the past two years.

"Probably fewer people still are aware that the Dominion can now boast (in the Hollinger Mine) the possession of one of the richest gold mines in the world. This mine, which has already distributed in dividends over £3,000,000 sterling, is situated in the Porcupine district of Northern Ontario, from which field the bulk of Canada's increasing gold production is derived.

"The potentialities of this field are unquestionably enormous as, although rich outcrops have been proved over a wide area, only some half dozen properties have as yet reached the production stage. Development was delayed for some years pending the building of the Temiskaming and Northern Ontario Railway. The rapid progress made upon its completion was interrupted a few years later by the outbreak of the war, with the result that even the richest undertakings, such as the Hollinger, had, on account of the difficulty in obtaining a sufficient supply of efficient labour, either to reduce their operations or suspend them entirely.

"Now, however, the outlook is much brighter, and there is every indication that this field will be exploited in a

manner commensurate with the proved wealth of its gold deposits, more especially having regard to the favourable conditions that obtain in the matter of water and timber supplies and the fact that ample hydro-electric power is now available.

"The gold-bearing formation of this district is a rock known as Kee-watin, which is one of the oldest geological formations in existence. The fact of its outcropping in this field is attributed to the action of glaciers, which it is believed have in past ages planed down the superimposed overburden and so left exposed a formation that geologists normally expect to find only at considerable depth.

"The principal mines so far opened up are the Hollinger, McInyre and Dome, all three of which are large producers, the aggregate production for the last three years 1919 to 1921 being as follows:—

"Amongst the developed but not yet producing mines, the most important property is the Porcupine-Davidson. This mine has been opened up to a depth of 600 ft., and according to the report of Lt.-Col. R. C. Fielding, A.R.S.M., M. Inst. M.M., the "profit" value of the ore indicated by the present workings is over £500,000. As in the case of the other mines mentioned, the presence of numerous gold bearing formations (more or less parallel with the main ore body) has been proved by diamond drilling. Arrangements are now being made for the equipment of this property with a mill capable of crushing at the rate of 175,000 tons per annum."

IS THE GOVERNMENT IN THE "HOME BREW" GAME?

In the Legislature last week Dr. Godfrey, M.P.P. for West York, read to the House a letter he had received from a Brockville doctor regarding the quality of liquor purchasable. A chemical analysis of brandy bought in the regular way for sick people showed the liquor to be turbid, adulterated, lacking body, too acid and altogether not good brandy. "This is the meanest kind of deception," Dr. Godfrey said, "for it is sick people who suffer from it." Dr. Godfrey charged that in its part in the liquor business the Province had broken the pure food laws of the country and should be prosecuted. In reply the Premier claimed that the Government had not authorized the "compounding" of liquors and that if a copy of the letters were left with him he would take the matter up. In reply again to this it may be said that if the Government has not actually gone into the "hooch" production game, it certainly is responsible for the situation that gives rise to all this "hooch" and "home brew,"—a menace to the healthy as well as the ailing. The Government in view of its attitude on the liquor question must accept the responsibility for the quality of the liquor sold by vendors authorized to sell the same. In its mania to enforce the Ontario Hooch Act the Government may be pointed to with pride by all the Province. Yes! No! Whatever other things the Farmer Government may show meanness in, the Raineyonians are sure generous enough, to their Hooch Hounds. The records would appear to show that not only has the Government given lucrative employment to various criminals but they also have paid for the liquor consumed by these characters and also have in cases defrayed the expenses of these gentlemen in their pleasure trips to disorderly houses. If on top of this, the Government favours turning the legalized sale of liquor into a peddling of home-brew or hooch then soon criticism will be disarmed, and even Hon. Mr. Dewart (the son of a Methodist minister) will have to admit that this is a Christian country. "Ain't we sending money now to Bolshevi-stricken Russia?"

In The Haileyburian last week there appeared the following item: "There was great hilarity at Elk Lake last Wednesday when two cases of gin which had been cached by some Poles got accidentally unearthed. The boys had a great time of it." The tragedy about this item is that it was taken from the files of the Haileybury newspaper in 1908. "Oh, memories that grip and burn."

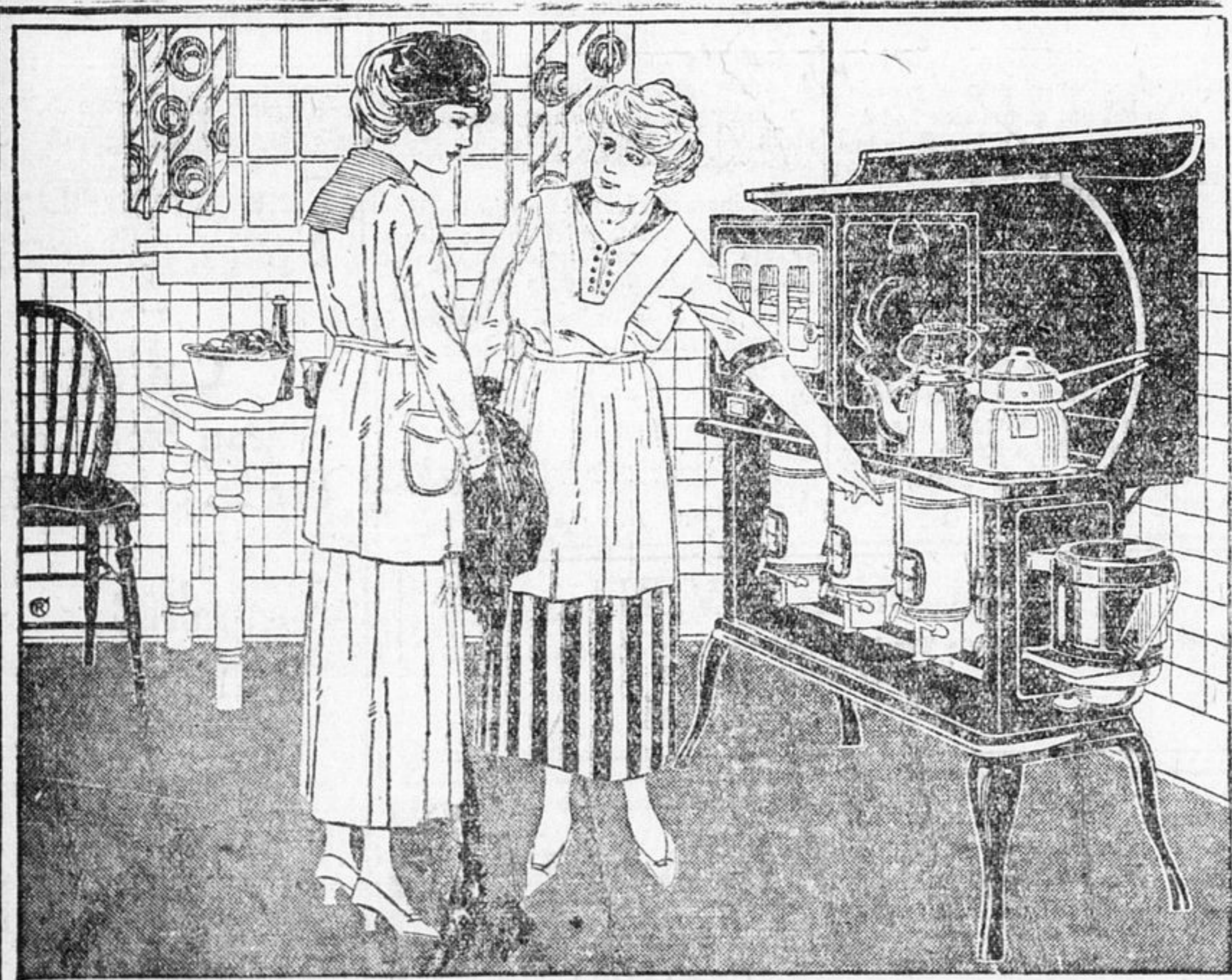
