**LONDON STATIST REVIEWS
WORLD'S GOLD PRODUCTION**

Gold production of the world for 1921 is estimated by the London Statist at just over 15½ million ounces, worth at normal price of the metal, nearly \$330,000,000. The world's output has fallen year by year from the high record of over \$480,000,000 worth of gold achieved in 1915. But the proportion for which the British Empire is responsible has risen from not more than 70 per cent, seven years ago, to about 70 per cent, for recent periods. To a large extent the decline in gold production since the middle of the war has been due to the abnormal increase in working costs, which has interfered with the profitable exploitation of older mines and delayed the opening up of newer fields.
That the relatively small fluctuations in the yearly output of gold have but little direct effect on international exchanges is due partly to the fact that the world's accumulated stocks have probably a value of as much as 2,000 millions sterling. This is without allowing for the enormous quantity

hoarded in the East and never likely to come out. Furthermore, the world's currencies are at present—outside the United States and a few small countries such as Switzerland—though nominally based on gold, actually to a large extent divorced from it. Mere increase of the output of the precious metals would not go far to span the abyss between Central European paper currencies and real wealth. Only restoration of international trade with a broad-scale development of all industry will solve the problem.

**TOUGH-OAKES TO RESUME
MILLING THIS MONTH**

The mill at the Tough-Oakes Mine at Kirkland Lake will be again in active operation during the next week or two. The mill has a capacity of 100 to 125 tons per day. The mill has not been in operation for the past three or four years owing to circumstances that have no bearing on the intrinsic value of the property. All the untoward conditions, however, have been eliminated, and the Tough-Oakes promises now to go ahead successfully as a producer. Work underground during the past year or so has been eminently satisfactory, revealing new sources of ore and extensions of developed ore.

**PARTRIDGE SEASON TO
OPEN ON OCTOBER 15th.**

According to advices from Toronto next fall the partridge shooting season is to be from the fifth to the twentieth of November, except in the districts north and west of the French and Mattawa rivers, where it will be from the 15th. of October to the 20th. of November. The bag is limited to not more than ten partridges daily. The bag for wild duck is to be limited to 25, with 200 as a maximum for the year.
