Porcupine Lodge of the Eastern Star are in Cochrane to-day assisting at the institution of the new Eastern Star Lodge there. A large number of ladies from Timmins and South Porcupine left to-day for the ceremonies at Cochrane.

Prospects continue very encouraging, to put it mildly, in connection with the work now under way in the Night Hawk Lake area. Another important strike was reported last week on the northwest shore of the Peninsula.

The Minstrel Troupe have had a number of successful practices recently and now have their show about perfected. The troupe may give its first public entertainment in the New Empire Theatre on the evening of May 24th, if stage settings, etc., arrive in time, otherwise another date will be announced.

**LIGHT RAILWAY CO. AGAIN ASKS GOVERNMENT HELP**

Again the government has been interviewed by the representatives of the Northern Light Railway Co., and this time, to judge by advices from Toronto, they made an impression upon Premier Drury. At any rate the Premier said he could see freight carrying possibilities in the proposed new lines, and he has asked that a complete detailed report be submitted to him. He also offered to arrange a conference between the promoters of the proposed Light Railway and the T. & N.O. Commission. The Northern Light Railway asked the Government for a guarantee of \$15,000 a mile to assist in building 100 miles of standard gauge railway east and west of Swastika.

**SOVEREIGN CONSIDERING ACTIVE DEVELOPMENT**

It is understood that plans are under consideration for active development of the Sovereign Gold Mine, and a meeting of shareholders will likely be called at an early date to get these plans under way. The Sovereign has a total of 120 acres, 40 acres adjoining the Hollinger and V.N.T. and the other 80 acres lying south. A certain amount of surface work together with some diamond drilling has been done on the property, but the present plans are for a thorough development to test up the property. The company is free from debt of any kind and has some money in the treasury, as well as about 400,000 shares of stock out of a capitalization of \$1,000,000 of shares of a par value of one dollar each.

**"TOPIC NIGHT" ON FRIDAY AT CALEDONIAN MEETING**

The meeting of the Caledonian Society of Timmins in the I.O.O.F. Hall on Friday evening of this week promises to be an unusually interesting one. 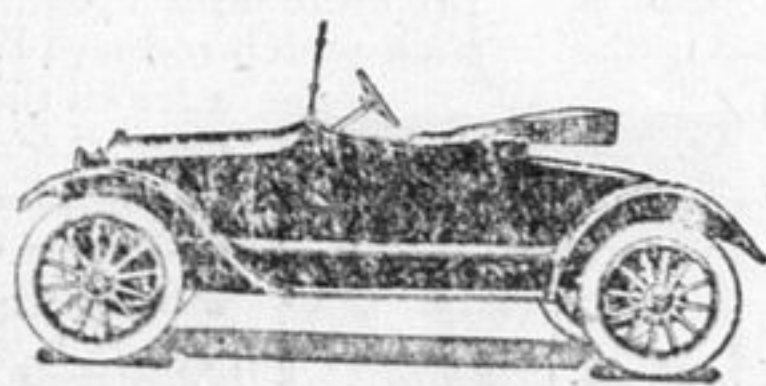
