PORCUPINE FAIR THIS YEAR TO BE BIG EVENT

Four Handsome Cups to be Among The Special Trophies. Fair Will Be Held Earlier.

The directors of the Porcupine Agricultural Society will hold a meeting in the Township Hall, Porcupine, (Golden City) on Thursday (tomorrow) afternoon. Many matters of importance will be before the meeting. It is the intention of the directors to make the 1292 Fair the biggest and best held in the North Land. Last year, the first year of the Porcupine Fair, the event was a success. But it was held on very short time for preparations and the date was late in the season. This year the event will be held earlier and the whole event will be on much larger scale. The directors are working, and will continue to work, to make the 1922 Fair a big and successful event.

Among the specially noteworthy prizes offered this year will be four handsome cups, all beautiful designs in silver. Reamsbottom & Edwards have on display at their store a fine silver trophy which will be awarded to the winner of the most first prizes. Anyone winning this trophy for three successive years will own this attractive cup. Mr. W. D. Pearce of South Porcupine is giving a fine silver cup for the best heavy draft team. Mr. A. C. White, of Hoyle, offers a handsome silver cup for the poultry department. Dr. J. A. McInnis, Mayor, of Timmins, is also presenting a silver cup for competition at the Porcupine Fair. There will be a large and attractive prize list in general and with the Fair held early in the season it is confidently expected that the 1922 Porcupine Fair at Golden City will be an event of outstanding importance and interest.

PROTEST AGAINST COBALT'S MAYOR AND A COUNCILLOR

As soon as there is not enough business to occupy the minds of the people in a town, there is sure to be something doing and people get "busy." At Cobalt last week legal proceedings were started apparently to disqualify the Mayor, Taylor Pipe, and one of the Councillors, Alderman Lafrange. Both are alleged to have had contracts with the municipality contrary to the provisions of the Municipal Act, and in addition the eligibility of the Mayor is attacked on the grounds that he does not conform with the regulations in regard to residence. Still further it is suggested that the Mayor, when sworn in did not take the proper oath. The names on the legal papers served include that of Judson Brown as re-lator and George Donaldson and Robert Holmes as bondsmen. The matter is to come before Judge Hartman on Friday of this week, May 12th. Reduced to terms of sport, and the matter must be more or less sport, a protest is apparently lodged against the Mayor and Councillor on the grounds that they have lost their amateur standing and that the Mayor does not come within the terms of the residence rule. An effort should be made to keep the N.O.H.A. out of this, or there may be several elections.

BASEBALL EXECUTIVE APPOINTED LAST WEEK

At the meeting of the Timmins Baseball Association called for Wednesday evening last week in the Council Chamber preparations were further advanced to get baseball going here. Fire Chief A. Borland presided at the meeting, and there was a general discussion for the good of baseball. Mr. J. Monaghan emphasized the necessity for getting baseball going at once. The Secretary reported that he had not received an answer from the Dome as to whether they would have a team in the Twilight League. It seemed to be certain, however, that there would be four or five other teams in the Twilight or local league. The Orientals had decided to put in a team. The McIntyre would also have a team and there would likely be two teams from the Hollinger. In addition it was probable that there would be a Town team for the Twilight League.

It was suggested by the Secretary that the best way to get baseball going was to elect an executive of four or five to work with the officers in the matter. This suggestion was generally approved and it was further suggested that the committee to be appointed include one representative from each team in the Twilight League. Accordingly the following committee was elected:—W. Pierce (Orientals), Jos. McGrath (Hollinger Shops and Mill), J. Scully (Hollinger Mine), C. Sheehan (McIntyre). If a Town team is formed a representative of this team will be added to the Committee. The Committee, working in conjunction with the officers, are to get busy at once and get baseball going. The officers, as elected some weeks ago, are: President—A. Borland; Vice-Pres.—J. Monaghan; Secretary—H. W. Hooker; Treasurer—D. Sutherland. The Secretary, H. W. Hoker, was appointed as a delegate to accompany Jas. Heppleston to the annual meeting of the Northern Ontario Baseball Association (the district organization).
