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**CLIFTON THIS SUMMER TO INSTALL MINING PLANT**

Development to be Proceeded With. All of Present Stock Offering to Go to Development.  
The Management of the Clifton-Porcupine Mines, Limited, are offering 170,000 shares of the Company's Treasury stock for public subscription at 30 cents per share. 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
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
