UNDERGROUND WIN FIRST GAME IN TOWN LEAGUE

Hollinger Underground won the first game in the town football league last Thursday with a 1-0 score. There was a good crowd out for the game and the keenly-contested match was followed with close interest throughout. The best of football was not possible on account of the grounds for the night, but considering everything it was a nice brand of football. In the first half the Town did not seem to extend themselves and though they put in extra digs in the last half they could not score and the one score by the Underground in the first remained the only count of the game. It was a good game to watch, and proved that Timmins this year has a fine array of good football talent. The teams were as follows:—

HOLLINGER UNDERGROUND ALSO WIN FROM SURFACE

The second game in the Town Football League added two more points on Saturday to the Underground credit when the Surface met defeat by the score of 3 to 2. Pearson of the Surface won the toss and took the Town goal with the wind in behind them, but the wind dropped soon after the kick-off. The Underground pressed and soon had the ball in danger of the opponent's goal and relief only came when Turnbull kicked the ball out for a corner. Lewis took the

kick and placed a nice centre only to be misjudged by Mullin who headed the ball out instead of in. This set the Surface men going but they found Stevenson and Berry hard to beat. Up to half time there was not much to choose between the teams, as the ball was kept in midfield most of the time through close playing and misjudging, with the no score result at the whistle.

The second half started with a bit better football, and the Surface soon had the ball around the goal, only to be sky-ed over the crossbar, followed by neat combination by Burt and Donald who in turn sent in a centre. Carr was intercepted by Turnbull. Mullin forced a corner which Lewis failed to lift off the ground. This was followed by another corner and Lewis sent in another ground shot. Traverton and Dunbar took the ball down the field, but missed the goal by a yard. Both teams were playing a hard match, with the Underground having a little better of the play. The first tally came within 10 minutes, when Lewis took the third corner and Carr headed it in. In five minutes Donald sent in another, followed by another by Burt. This set the Surface men on their mettle. They let out to the limit and were rewarded by a goal from Pearson. The play was now open with better results from the Surface. The latter tallied their second half a minute from time when Mills scored while lying prone on the ground. The line-ups were as follows:—

CASE DISMISSED LAST WEEK AGAINST PORTER

On Thursday last Magistrate Atkinson dismissed the case against the Pullman car porter who was charged with breach of the O.T.A. Constable Rayeroff, of Moneta, had started the investigation that led to the charge against the porter, a couple of suitcases containing liquor having been found in the car. Officers McCauley and Grenier had assisted Officer Rayeroff in the case, but their evidence was not clear or definite in connecting the accused with the alleged breach of the law. The Magistrate dismissed the case after hearing the evidence.

Mrs. Bergerhout was committed for trial before a judge on a charge of a breach of the section of the Code relating to articles, medicines or drugs intended or represented as for illegal purposes. Mrs. Burgerhout was granted bail and will likely be given trial at Haileybury next month.

The two cases against Mr. E. Ray, one for alleged disorderly action and the other for resisting arrest, were remanded until this week's court.
