JUNIOR BASEBALL FOR DISTRICT SUGGESTED

Iroquois Falls Thinks Junior Sport Should be Specially Encouraged. Jr. League of Cochrane, Falls and Timmins.

Mr. Alex Dewar, Editor of The Broke Hustler, Iroquois Falls, has taken up the cudgels for Junior Baseball. He thinks the only way to train players for the senior teams and have first-class sport is to get the Juniors going under the best circumstances. In a letter last week he points out that Iroquois Falls this summer is figuring as regards baseball along the same lines as in hockey,—that is, that a Junior Baseball team, made up of the boys of the town is the way to train for the Senior team. The matter of training for Senior teams was taken up at the N.O.B.A. meeting at Cochrane recently and the proposal made for a Junior Baseball League for the district. The age limit seemed to be the chief difficulty. Both Cochrane and the Falls found they had few lads under age and for their junior teams would have to rely upon young fellows working in their towns. The Falls suggested that the age limit for the proposed Junior team be set at 21. Cochrane proposed that it be 22 on July 1st, 1922. The latter limit was eventually agreed upon, and now it is desired to have the co-operation of Timmins as the idea would be to have the Junior League cover the three towns the same as the Senior League. Mr. Dewar says that the Falls and Cochrane are ready to come into such a league and so it is up to Timmins.

Speaking of the matter of expense, Mr. Dewar points out that it would be worth all it would cost and more. The expenses would not be very great for the Junior League as the amount of travelling would not be very serious if the League were confined to Cochrane, Timmins and the Falls. In the matter of equipment the Falls will utilize old uniforms and supplies from the Senior team and the other towns no doubt could do the same. Home and home games could be arranged, or a double home and home scheduled. A Junior League like that proposed would no doubt develop into a good thing for baseball in the district. It appears to be up to Timmins to get busy in the matter. Mr. Dewar's letter has been turned over to the President of the Timmins Baseball Association, Chief Borland, for consideration and action.

Iroquois Falls Board of Trade last week petitioned the T. & N. O. for a resuming of the summer service given on the line last year. In the strongly worded resolution sent to the Railway the Board of Trade points out that last summer's service gave a very fine service to Cochrane, while the present poor service means that it practically takes a whole day to visit Cochrane.

CALEDONIAN CHOIR TO MEET FRIDAY AT 7.30 P.M.

BABY TAKEN ILL ON TRAIN NEAR TEMAGAMI LAST WEEK

The Northern News of Cobalt last week says:—
"The ten months old child of a passenger on the afternoon train northbound on Wednesday was seized with convulsions while the train was between North Bay and Temagami. At the latter station the brakeman was able to secure temporary relief for the baby and he telegraphed to Cobalt for medical assistance. Dr. Mitchell was waiting when the train reached here at half-past three and rendered aid, and the infant was able to continue the journey to Timmins, the remainder of the trip being made without mishap, it is stated. The child had two attacks south of Cobalt, the second after the train had left Temagami."

REQUEST RESTORATION OF WEEK-END FARES ON RY.

Last week The Advance made extended reference to the bill introduced in the House of Commons by Mr. T. L. Church, M.P., Toronto, regarding the restoration of the special reduced fares for week-ends and other occasions as prevailing on the railways before the war. In line with this idea there are many evidences that there is a general demand for a return to the former system of reduced railway rates. The matter is of very special importance to the North Land on account of the great distances covered by this country. Special excursions and week-end rates would do a great deal to bring the rather widely separated towns of the North into closer touch with each other. In the matter of sports, reduced fares for special occasions would be of the greatest benefit. Also, there is reason for believing that the Railway would actually benefit by such special rates. Up to the present, however, the invariable answer of the T. & N. O. when any form of reduced rate is proposed is that the Canadian Passenger Association won't let them. Mr. Church's bill would take away the latter excuse. But unfortunately, Mr. Church's bill has not yet been passed. In the meantime, however, Cobalt Board of Trade is not letting the question rest. At the last meeting of Cobalt Board of Trade the question was discussed and a resolution was passed asking the T. & N. O. Railway Commission to put the pre-war rates in force again, at least for week-ends. The matter is also to be taken up with the Associated Boards of Trade at the next meeting of that body.

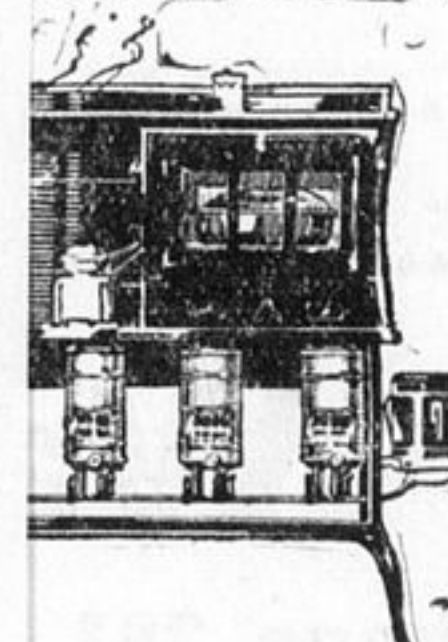
