DOMESTIC MINE ESTABLISHES NEW HIGH RECORD IN APRIL

April proved a record month for the Dome Mines. The production totalled \$377,000 in gold. The mill handled an average of 950 tons per day. It is estimated that the net profit for the month of April will be \$250,000. The grade of ore is given as around \$14.00 in gold to the ton.

REPORT NOT READY YET ON ELECTRIFICATION OF T. & N. O.

Reports have appeared in some newspapers to the effect that an exhaustive report on the electrification of the T. & N. O. Railway had been submitted to the Ontario Government or to Premier Drury, which amounts to about the same thing. This report does not appear to be quite correct. It is understood that engineering experts have been at work for some months making out a report regarding the T. & N. O. electrification, but only an interim report has been submitted as yet to the T. & N. O. Commission and no report of any kind has so far been given to the Premier or the Government. Further, it is understood that the report in preparation will be an exhaustive one, giving in the fullest detail the figures of the cost of complete electrification of the T. & N. O. from the Bay to Tin Can and the other Bay.

AUTHORITIES PREDICT BOOM IN MINING INDUSTRY

Hamilton B. Wills & Co.'s Market Despatch last week features the following:—
"Big developments at the various mines in the United States and Canada are expected during the current year, because of the fact that labor is now plentiful and costs have come down materially from those prevailing shortly after the end of the war. These facts have caused a large number of mines to resume operations, and others to commence development campaigns on a larger scale than heretofore. A boom in the mining stocks is usually the result of large scale development operations, which almost invariably open up important new ore bodies.

DEAD BODY OF MAN LEFT THREE DAYS IN THE RIVER

Outcome of the Usual Unchristian Attitude of the Provincial Authorities.

On Friday the dead body of a man was found in Mountjoy Creek and the Provincial Police notified. The police were promptly enough on the scene, but though the coroner had given due authority for the burial of the body which was badly decomposed, the attitude of the Province prevented any undue haste in the burial. The Provincial has apparently unlimited money for all sorts of rum hounds, but it has evidently no proper funds at its disposal for any works of mercy or decency. Constables are only allowed \$15.00 for any burials of this kind, and before the Provincial officer could find anyone to more than look at the body for this ridiculous amount or find time from his other onerous duties to look after the sad duty himself a couple of days had gone by, during which the body was floating in the creek, a sight for curious youngsters and morbid grown-ups.

The body is supposed to be that of Walter Niemi, a Finlander, whose coat and hat were found on the river bank last fall and who was believed to have committed suicide.

The body being found in Mountjoy, which is unorganized territory, was wholly and solely in the jurisdiction of the Province, and adjacent municipalities and individuals were powerless to do anything.
