DEPARTING MEMBER HONORED
BY CALEDONIAN SOCIETY

One of the special features at the meeting of the Caledonian Society of Timmins on Friday evening last was the presentation made to Mrs. Simpson. Mrs. Simpson was one of the first lady members of the Society, sharing the actual honour of being first with her daughters here, Mrs. A. Roberts, Mrs. J. Cowan and Mrs. J. Collins. Mrs. Simpson is leaving this week to return to Scotland to take up residence there. In making the presentation the President, Mr. M. B. Scott, referred to the general affection and esteem in which Mrs. Simpson was held by all and the generous assistance and interest she had always given to the affairs of the Society. All were sincerely sorry to lose Mrs. Simpson, but all would wish her the very best, and live in hopes that she would yet return to Timmins. Mrs. Simpson was presented with a beautiful gold wrist watch as a mark of the regard of the Caledonians and the wish of the members that she may always have the "best time." The presentation was a complete surprise to Mrs. Simpson who was fairly overcome by the whole-hearted demonstration that followed the presentation.

During the evening the President also had occasion to voice the general sincere regret of the Society at the loss of another two valuable members, Mr. and Mrs. J. E. Steele, who are moving to Montreal. For several months past Mr. and Mrs. Steele have been popular members of the Society, winning many friends here, all of whom are sorry to see them leaving this Camp.

The meeting of the Caledonians Friday was in the form of a Social evening and a programme of unusual merit was presented. It was the last regular meeting until after the hot summer months, and so was planned to be something special. It proved to be one of the very best yet. The attendance was specially large, running over the hundred mark, and all present had a very enjoyable evening. The Secretary, Mr. C. G. Pirie, had charge of the programme, and the Treasurer, Mr. W. Coupar, looked after the refreshments. Both are to be congratulated on the very pleasing results of their efforts. The programme included dancing music, addresses and the appetizing refreshments. Through an error in the mail or express service the regular lithographs and programmes for the event had not arrived, and the delivery rig and sandwich boy style of advertising had failed to give the right impression of the concert. The programme by the Quintile Trio was a high-class event by gifted artists, a rare musical treat. The local advertising unfortunately did not convey this impression. However, what the audience lacked in numbers they made up in sincere appreciation and enthusiasm. Repeatedly the artists were given outbursts of unstinted applause as the merits of the programme became evident. As Mayor McInnis, the chairman, pointed out in his remarks, Timmins has been favoured with nothing so superior in the musical line since the visit of the Russian violinists here some years ago.

Before the Thursday evening concert had concluded efforts were made to prevail on the Trio to remain over the week-end. Fortunately, this was possible, and Sunday evening after the church services the Quintile Trio gave another concert in the New Empire. The Sunday evening event was up to the high standard set on Thursday night. There was a large attendance, the excellence of the Thursday evening concert being a good advertisement for the second event and this being supplemented by printed announcements distributed on Saturday. The programme on Sunday evening was a very attractive one, and each number was enthusiastically received. The beautiful rendition of such numbers as "The Rosary," "Mother Macree," and several other classics made particular appeal to the audience. The audience gave unquestionable proof of their appreciation of the Trio, and any further visits of the Quintile Trio will undoubtedly draw crowded houses in Timmins.
