CATTLE HELD NEARLY A DAY IN ENGLEHART YARDS

Reports have come to The Advance of a very undesirable state of affairs on the T. & N. O., and though The Advance is not expecting much until the Commission shows it is anxious to do the right thing by resuming the summer service on this line similar to last year, the Humane Society may not feel as tolerant or hopeless in the matter. The case referred to particularly is the system prevailing in the shipment of cattle over the line. Some days ago cars of cattle were held at Englehart for nearly twenty-four hours before being shipped on to this north. The cattle arrived at Englehart at 8 the one morning and were not taken on until 6 the next morning. There are some facilities of a kind at Englehart for the watering and feeding of stock, but anyone who has handled cattle on the trains will agree that a stop like the one noted above is not a good thing by any means, to put it mildly. It is not pleasant for the cattle, nor profitable for the shippers, even if the public at this end are not to be considered.

If the T. & N. O. is so hard run as to be unable to provide proper facilities for the traffic the remedy does not appear to be undesirable economies with the profitable traffic. The remedy would rather appear to be to practice the economies in the poor-paying sections of the line. Iroquois Falls, Cochrane and the Porcupine Camp are the best customers of the T. & N. O. and the traffic for these points is a profitable feature of the road. With the right sort of attention and service there would be more trade here. Accordingly a complete return to last summer's service would be advisable. If it is necessary to cut down the service the southern part of the line is the place to start. The point often emphasized by thoughtful people here is the idea that if Numbers 46 and 47 must be taken off above Englehart, then these trains should have been cancelled altogether all along the line. Of course, this was not done because the southern towns raised such a howl when it was proposed. If a passenger train can be made to pay on the traffic to Englehart, it certainly would pay to run it on to Timmins for the traffic coming this way. And what applies to passenger service applies with equal force to freight service. The Commission should guard against any tendency, too evident in past days, to leave the thriving section here in the far north out of consideration.

Returning to the case of the cattle held at Englehart, steps should be taken to guard against a repetition of this sort of thing. Also there should

be attention given to the possibility of any kind of freight being stalled at Englehart. If fruit, for instance, coming north this summer should be subject to delay like the cattle, it is easy to see the disadvantage to the people of this part of the North Land and to all concerned, including the T. & N. O.

WORK STARTED TO-DAY ON ROAD TO JUNCTION.

Work commenced this (Wednesday) morning on the renewing of operations of the construction of the highway from the Porcupine to Porquis Junction, and the work will be rushed along to completion.

EXPLOSION OF GASOLINE TANK CAUSES GIRL'S DEATH

A sad accident occurred at Iroquois Falls on Saturday whereby Miss Desolina Sandrin, employed in the Abitibi Laundry, met sudden death. An inquest was held with Coroner F. C. Evans, of South Porcupine, presiding, and the evidence went to show that the acting manager of the laundry, Mr. R. A. Stockman, had washed out an old gasoline tank and then attempted to solder it. Despite the fact that the tank was first washed out and in any case had not been in use for months, there was gas in it and it exploded. Miss Sandrin was burned and otherwise injured in the explosion and death resulted. All the laundry employees were called as witnesses, as well as some other citizens who were on the scene at the time or shortly after the explosion. The jury's verdict was to the effect that the death of the young lady was due to an accident and that as all reasonable precautions had been taken, no one was responsible for the sad death.

JUNIOR FOOTBALL GAMES IN FIRST LEAGUE SERIES.

The next Junior League Football match on the schedule is the Dome at Schumacher on Thursday of this week. Next Monday Timmins Juniors play at the Dome and Thursday of next week Schumacher Juniors play at the Dome. TOWN WINS 4 TO 1 FROM UNDERGROUND IN FOOTBALL

Last night's game in the Town Football League series proved a very interesting one, with a very keen contest staged. The Town team won by a score of 4 to 1, but the Underground team contested every minute of the game. Mr. A. J. Downie refereed the game. There were a couple of accidents in the game, two of the players receiving painful though fortunately not serious injuries.

NUMBER FROM TIMMINS ON GROUNDED STEAMER

Miss Rawlinson, Mr. Robert Lill, Mrs. Robt. Russell, Mrs. A. Haugland and Miss Edith Haugland were among the passengers on the steamer Montcalm, the C.P.R. liner reported as aground at Point Bigot in the St. Lawrence between Three Rivers and Quebec last week. The Montcalm, from despatches sent out since, apparently had a minor accident to its steering gear and was grounded as a consequence. The passengers were in no danger and no particular harm of any kind was done by the accident except the injury to the boat and the resulting delay. A steamer and a tug were at once despatched to the Montcalm and eventually it was decided to transfer the passengers to a White Star liner, "Canada." This was done and the passengers are now happily on their way again to the land overseas.

MANY CASES AT POLICE COURT LAST THURSDAY

There was a very long and busy session for the police court last Thursday. The evidence on the cases against Mr. E. Ray took up considerable time, Mr. Ray having a number of witnesses to show that he had not been responsible for any disorder. On the other hand the evidence of Officer McCauley was to the contrary. After hearing the evidence Magistrate Atkinson reserved decision until this week.

Chief C. McInnis of South Porcupine had Andy Derosa before the court on a charge of having liquor illegally in other than a private dwelling. Derosa was fined \$200.00 and costs.

The case of immorality against a Schumacher man was remanded for a week.

The Chinese laundryman, named Lim, who has been in town for some weeks from South End and who was charged with indecency in regard to a lad of nine years of age, was sent down for three months.

The charge against J. Gilbert for alleged breach of the O.T.A. was remanded to this week.

Mr. W. Digby, now of Detroit, but formerly one of the first pioneers of the Porcupine, is a visitor here and innumerable old friends are delighted to see him again. It is ten years since Mr. Digby left here and he is greatly impressed with the wonderful growth and progress of the Camp.
