TIMMINS WINS, 3 TO 1, FROM KIRKLAND LAKE, SATURDAY

In the second game played by Timmins in the N.O.F.A. series for the Dickson Cup, on the athletic grounds here on Saturday, Timmins team defeated Kirkland Lake by a score of 3 to 1. Kirkland Lake has a good team, but Timmins had a little the better of the play all the way through. At the end of the first half the score stood 1 to 0 in favour of Timmins.

The rain all day made the ground heavy going, but it cleared an hour before the kick-off. There were about 300 present and there was a general opinion that it was one of the liveliest and most interesting games played here for some time.

Kirkland Lake won the toss and chose the south goal although there was not anything to favour them. At the kick-off the ball travelled to Springham who at once took it along to the goal, but his pass was intercepted. Kirkland showed speed, but found the Timmins half-backs waiting for them. Soon the ball was passing back to Dunbar who took it up the wing but held on to it too long and was robbed of it by McPhail who sent it to Steve Lynn. This was followed by a series of attacks on Timmins goal and for about ten minutes Street was pulling off some of the best saves that have been seen in football in the North. Some looked like impossible shots to stop but Street saved them, sometimes by what looked like a miracle. Relief came when Steve sent a hot one over the bar. The match was going at full speed now and Timmins took the opportunity of attacking with a combined run by Dunbar, A. Cadman and Carr, Dunbar passing to Carr who was intercepted by Ramsay whose kick was weak and A. Cadman took the opportunity of first-time kick and sent the ball in. It struck the upright and swerved into the net for first going, giving Elrick no chance. Half-time score 1 to 0.

The second half started well. After a few minutes the pace seemed to tell on Kirkland Lake. For the first twenty minutes they were kept to their own half and Elrick had a bad time of it, but he showed he was in his old-time form, for, like Street, he had a number of hard ones to clear. Ramsay got on to the ball and sent it out to Basset who made a run and centered. Donalds robbed the Lake just in the nick of time, but could not clear, and Steve passed to Hamilton who sent in a high one that gave Street no chance. This set Timmins going again and five minutes later, Mc

Phail miskicked to his own goal, Carr quickly passed it to Springham who netted the second for Timmins. Two minutes later Ramsay fouled A. Cadman in the penalty area. A. Cadman took the kick and gave Elrick little chance, sending in a hot ground shot that made it three for Timmins. The match was a hard-fought one, Kirkland Lake having most of the play the first half and Timmins the second period. The only let-up to the game was when A. Cadman, who was injured in Tuesday's match, was unlucky in getting his injured leg kicked and was laid out for the fifth time by being kneed in the wind, having to be carried off the field, only to return for the finish. There was little choice in regard to individual players, for each man on both teams played his position and played hard and well. The line-up was as follows:—

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
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
