BAND TO HOLD ANOTHER REGATTA THIS SUMMER

Last Year's Success Induced Band to Decide on Having Regatta as Annual Feature.

A gold discovery has been made by New Liskeard men three miles from Willisville station on the Algoma Central railway, about 66 miles from Sudbury. The claims are a quarter of a mile from the Majestic Mining Co. group, one half mile from the railway. The vein uncovered is stated to show values in gold, silver, copper and platinum.

GEOLOGIST HOPKINS SEES ACTIVITY IN PROSPECTING

Mr. Percy Hopkins, geologist for the Ontario Dept. of Mines, says that there are more prospectors working in the North Land this year than ever before in the history of the country, and he expects that there will be important discoveries following the extended prospecting now in progress. With the present activity it is but reasonable to look forward to noteworthy finds in this country of rich mineral resources. Mr. Hopkins is at present making a survey of the eastern part of the Kirkland Lake area.

MINES OF NORTH LAND NOW BOOSTED IN OLD COUNTRY

The London Financier, an important financial paper of England, is at present running a series of articles on the mineral wealth of Ontario. These articles are based on the observations and investigation of a special representative sent to Canada recently for the purpose.

"Enthusiasts look forward to the day when Ontario will be producing more gold than the Rand," states the Financier. "That may appear to some to be an extravagant expectation, but the results so far obtained justify the hope that before many years elapse, Ontario will have enormously increased its output of gold and that the record of the Rand, if it is not surpassed, will at least be closely approached."

In touching on the present position of Canadian gold stocks on the London market, The Financier comments that "one has only to look at the list of mining shares quoted on the London Stock Exchange to discover how small a place Canada occupies in this particular field of investment. There are hundreds of African and Australian shares, but the Canadian mining securities known and dealt in here are not considered sufficiently numerous or important to be separately classified and are included in the nondescript miscellaneous list. As a field for investment of British capital the vast mineral resources of Canada, we repeat, are comparatively unknown and neglected. How long, it may be asked, is that state of affairs to continue? Not for long, we should imagine, unless the British investor, hitherto the pioneers of mineral development in all parts of the world, has completely lost his sense and power of enterprise and initiative. Recent events in Canada have demonstrated beyond a doubt that the country is rich, how rich can be but dimly conceived, in mineral resources of the most diversified kind and rich beyond the dreams of avarice in payable gold. Their exploitation is merely a question of time. British investors, unless they wish to allow astute American rivals to secure the prize, cannot afford much longer to treat Canada's mineral wealth with apathy and indifference. They must awaken without delay to the great opportunities that lie within their grasp. By investing in Canada they will not only be helping themselves but will be fulfilling the very patriotic duty of investing imperially."

That's the stuff to give the troops, old top! Britishers investing in Ontario's gold mines will be serving both their individual advantage and the imperial advantage as well.

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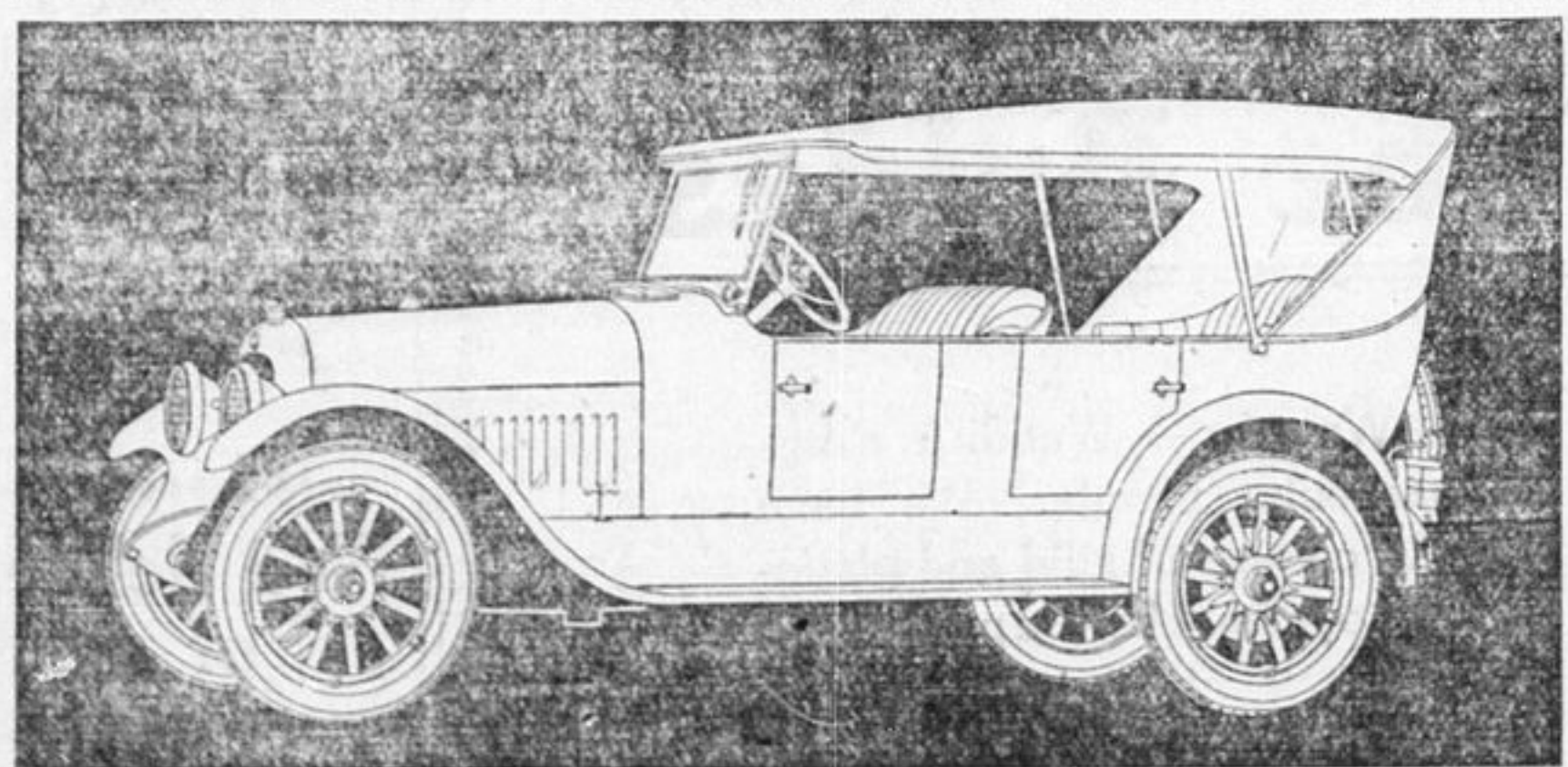
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
