### DIVISION COURT SITS AT SOUTH PORCUPINE LONG LIST OF CASES

Owing to the snow blockade between here and Cochrane, His Honor was unable to commence court until Thursday afternoon, and despite the fact that the court sat till late that evening another night session was necessary on Friday.

In addition to the usual cases held here, considerable interest was evinced in the eleven Canadian Automobile Co. suits, against well known residents of the camp, claiming the unpaid balance of stock that had been allotted to them by the company.
