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BOARD OF TRADE IN REGULAR SESSION

The regular meeting of the Board of Trade of Timmins was held on Friday, in the Council Chamber, the chair being taken by Mr. Dayton Ostrosser, President, at 8 o'clock. About a dozen members were present.

The minutes of the last meeting were read by Secretary Simms, and approved.

The Board have the sum of \$300 in hand, and set aside for patriotic purposes, and it was ordered that \$100 of this amount be paid over to the treasurer of the Central Relief Association.

The Secretary was instructed to communicate with Sir Adam Beck, Minister of Power in the Ontario Cabinet, and Mr. A. G. Kirby, asking for information regarding the extension of Hydro-Electric power into the north country.

On the subject of telephone and light rates, the committee reported that they had had an informal meeting with Mr. Black, the manager, and had been informed that a new schedule would be put into force in January, governing both phone and light rates. The committee were instructed to again approach Mr. Black, on his next visit, and to press matters.

A Membership Committee, composed of Mr. Tom King and Mr. Geo. Preston, was appointed with a view to collecting subscriptions due, and drumming up new members.

The meeting then adjourned to meet again on Friday, February 11, at 8 o'clock.
