Relay Race Won By Timmins Team

The relay race, the last event of the Big Sports Night last Saturday evening, was won by the Timmins Hockey team.

The race consisted of four representatives of each team entering, each representative making three complete circuits of the course.

There were three teams entered in all—Dome, Hollinger and Timmins. Ratz, Keeley, Buchanan and Everard for Dome; Horne, Smylie, Lowe and Lafreniere for Hollinger, and McGuire, Brennan, Cauley and Spence for Timmins.

Horne secured a lead of three yards on McGuire in the first three laps, while both led Ratz by several yards, but lost mostly by not being able to negotiate the corners. Brennan just nosed Smylie out at the end of the next three laps, and although

Keeley gained considerably on both, he failed to overcome the distance lost by Ratz.

Cauley established a good lead for Timmins in the third spasm. At first it looked very much as if Lowe were going to run away from him. However, he slowed up in the last lap and Cauley made good use of his advantage. Buchanan just managed to hold his own.

Lafreniere was dangerously close to Spence in his second lap in the final, but fell, allowing Spence to secure a good lead which he maintained to the finish. Both Spence and Lafreniere had too much of a lead on Everard, which prevented him being at all dangerous.

The Dome boys showed their good sportsmanship by entering the race, as they did not come prepared; however, they entered a team just to make it more interesting; some of their fastest skaters were not present, otherwise there might have been a different complexion on the result.
