JOHN L. SULLIVAN SAYS WILLIARD IS A COUNTERFEIT

John L. Sullivan, holder of the heavyweight crown for a longer period than any other man in modern times, was not impressed with Willard's performance against Moran. He differed from the other critics inasmuch as he considers that Moran won by a mile. In his opinion Willard is a "counterfeit champion."

Says John L.—"Up there with 58 pounds advantage in weight, Willard let a little man with a fighting heart bring the battle to him from the first tap of the gong until the end of the final round. I can only see that Willard is entitled to one round—the sixth, and in that he had only a slight shade. The only other rounds which were not Moran's by a mile were the fourth and the seventh. The thing that surprised me most from the start of the fight was that Willard, big as a mountain, and possessor of everything that should have given him the confidence of a Jove, seemed to be as rattled as a novice appearing before a crowd for the first time.

"I don't think that Willard hit Moran or even attempted to hit him as many times as twice with the weight of his great body behind the punches. Willard is an arm puncher and, while he hits straight from the shoulder, the impetus of his blow is all derived from his upper arm muscles. He doesn't put his whole body in a punch and drive it through like an express train, and Moran does exactly this.

"The fifth round made me think of that famous old mill at Coney Island between Jim Jeffries and little Tom Sharkey. I remember that Sharkey landed six overhand swings on Jeffries' ear and jaw without a return, and had the giant looking like a boob for a minute or two. Similarly Saturday night in the fifth round Moran leaned Willard up against the ropes almost directly above where I was sitting and lunged eight solid left and right drives on the champion's neck, ear and jaw.

"And then, when he had fought himself away from the ropes, Willard overlooked the greatest opportunity that he had in the entire fight to put Moran out. Frank was tired from swinging on Jess, and as he swung away he left the point of his jaw wide open and about 15 inches from Willard's right, which was beautifully poised to deliver a knockout.

"I think Willard was in disgusting condition, and I think Moran was

not as well trained as he might have been. I think if these men had gone through a course of training such as good old Billy Muldoon put me thru when he was preparing me for my fight with Kilrain, Jess would have tumbled into the ring weighing about 225 pounds and Moran would have been in splendid shape at 190. Instead Willard, carrying far too much of his 259½ pounds around his middle, looked soft and seemed to be tiring before the fight had gone four rounds.

"Moran, too, did not seem to have the stamina that proper training would have brought, and I am inclined to blame both of these men though perhaps the blame more rightly should be placed upon the modern methods of conditioning fighters, for appearing before such a wonderful house in such comparatively poor condition.

"To sum up the battle as I saw it, Moran had a clean shade in the first, second, third, fifth, eighth, ninth and tenth rounds. Willard had a shade in the sixth, and the fourth and seventh were even.

"Unfortunately we seemed to have a boxer for a champion and a fighter as the leading aspirant to the title. I hope a way can be arranged to get these men together over a route, but if the day comes when that match is made I feel like volunteering as an aide in Moran's camp, and I'll guarantee to send him to the scratch in green shape to take Mr. Willard's crown away from him."

TORONTO MAN WINS BOWLING TITLE IN TOLEDO TOURNEY

A great reception will be extended to Sam Sehlman, the Toronto ten pin expert who won the individual championship at the A. B. C. tourney, on his return home. Sehlman showed his skill and gameness by winning the roll-off for first place last night at Toledo. He was opposed to Heusman, of Cincinnati, and Shaw, of Chicago, who tied him in the scheduled play with 685 pins. This big total was not even approached by either of the trio in the roll off, the bowlers evidently being affected by the importance of the occasion, and failing to roll to form. Sehlman ran into three splits in the first game, and stopped at 167, but in the last two strings he shot carefully, bunching three strikes in the middle game for 291 and coming back with two strikes and eight spares in the last for 196 and a total of 564. Heusman played in free style but was in hard luck, three wide open splits and a cherry

in the last game forcing him to drop to second place. Frank Shaw shot an errorless series until the final game, when three splits cropped up and killed off his chances. He threw his last three shots in poor style, and made two errors. Scores follow:

Patrick Refuse Hockey Peace

The National Hockey Association magnates held a meeting in Montreal last week to discuss ways and means to bring about a settlement of the tangle with the Western League. President Quinn was in the chair, and the following delegates were in attendance:—Barney Kane, Quebec; F. Shaughnessy, Ottawa; Eddie Livingstone, Toronto; Sammy Liehtenstein, Wanderers, and Geo. Kennedy, Canadiens.

Quinn announced that the main object was to obtain a consensus of opinion regarding a possible peace agreement with the West, and just what each of the different owners would expect. Manager Savage, of the Portland club, arrived shortly before noon, having been invited to be present by Quinn, in order that he might be able to take back to the Coast with him a first-hand idea of the attitude of the Eastern owners.

The following despatch from Vancouver shows how President Frank Patrick feels about peace: "Frank Patrick, when asked, positively denied that he instructed Savage to negotiate for hockey peace. The Coast League is unwilling to return Toronto players or pay \$500 for any of them. As a matter of fact, Patrick says he will not pay a cent to either Toronto or the N.H.A., and is quite content to let matters stand as they are."

With President Patrick's statement before them they could do very little Ed. Livingstone for playing Holmes and Foyston against the Canadiens, and then the delegates discussed the system of rules, and all the delegates seemed in favor of changing the penalty system, which at the present time is no better than none at all. One delegate suggested that the association adopt the Western style, which had been endorsed by the N.H.A. officials who were acting in the present series between Portland and Canadiens. Another suggestion was to the effect that substitutes be allowed for minor fouls only, and the offending team be compelled to play short-handed in case of major fouls. The off-side rule also came up for discussion, and the O.H.A. style was much favored by the delegates, and it would not be surprising if it was adopted for next season.

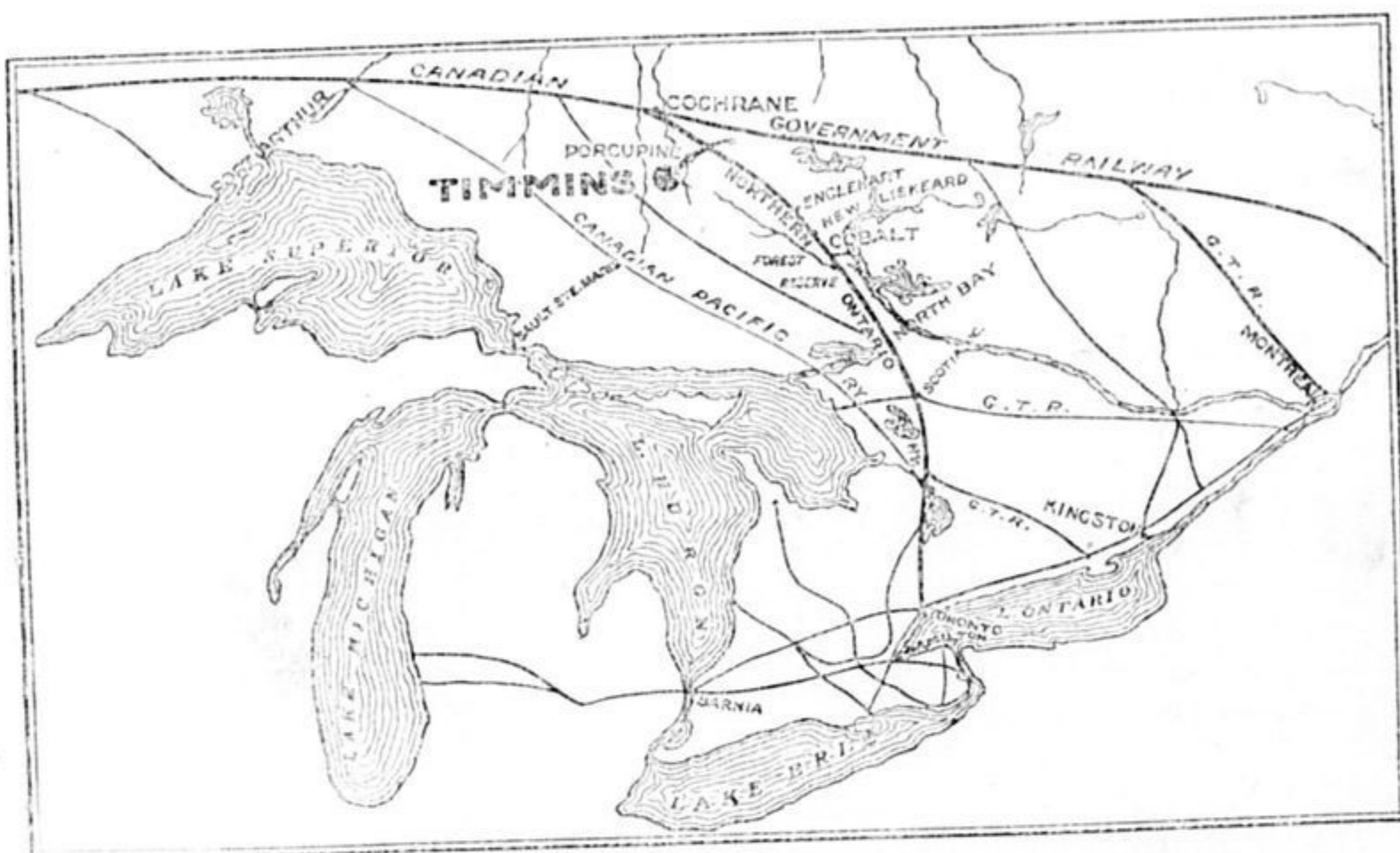

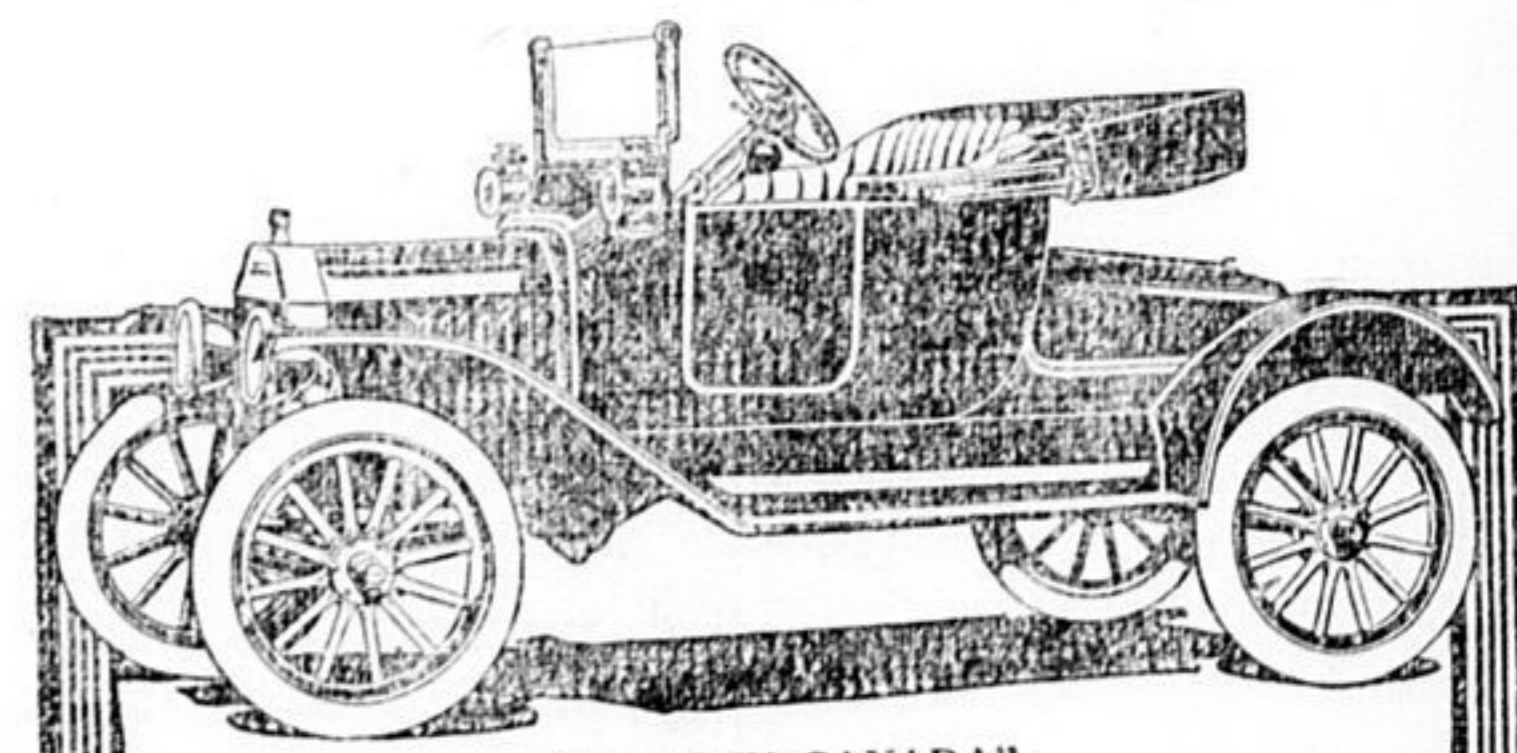
