Timmins News in Brief

Mrs. P. A. Robbins left on Monday for Toronto and other eastern points.

Mayor Wilson left town on the noon train Monday for a three or four days business visit to Toronto.

Mr. and Mrs. Geo. S. Lowe returned on Saturday last from Toronto, where Mr. Lowe underwent an operation for appendicitis.

Nicholson of the Timmins Platoon, 159th Battalion, wishes to acknowledge the following kind donations to the boys during the past couple of days: Mr. Matt Boivin and Chief Courtemanche, one box cigars and a carton of 50 packages of cigarettes; D.Y.B. M. Abraham, who was in the stationery business in South Porcupine in the early days of the camp, was a visitor in Timmins over the week end. Since Mr. Abraham's departure some three years ago, he has been in business at Vancouver, but owing to the war he was forced to discontinue like many others in the west. It is his intention to open a business in Timmins in the near future.

Rev. J. H.
