FIREMAN CONSIDER INSURANCE QUESTION

Concert Committee Had Satisfactory Report--Better Attendance Urged.

One of the main items of interest to which attention was drawn at a meeting of the South Porcupine Fire Dept. in the Fire hall on Tuesday evening was the report of the Concert Committee which showed that the sum of \$57.00 had been raised at the concert held about a month ago. This was deemed highly satisfactory and the report was unanimously adopted.

There were present at the meeting eight members of the Department—Messrs. Chief Fairbairn, in the chair, G. Henry, H. Gibson, J. Easton, C. Carr, P. C. Brennan, P. C. M. Salle and G. Qua, Secretary. It has been pointed out by the officials that despite the fact postcard notices had been sent out to 28 members of the Department in all, this was the total attendance and an urgent request is made that those concerned put in an appearance at future meetings.

The question of insurance was also brought forward, but no action taken in the matter. Two companies had presented terms. In one case a "blanket" policy was offered, this meaning that ten men were to be insured by which step it would result in the whole Department being covered because it was extremely unlikely that ten men would be incapacitated at one time. In another case the terms quoted were \$4.50 per man per \$1,000 policy.

Lowery Resigns As Commissioner

Those who followed the reports regarding the recommendation for certain liquor licenses for Cobalt, by the Board of Commissioners of Temiskaming, will probably be interested to note that Provincial Secretary Hon. J. W. Hanna, has taken exception to the qualification of one of the Commissioners to act in that capacity.

Mr. R. W. Lowery is the member referred to and following up Mr. Hanna's ruling on the question, he has resigned his seat as a Commissioner. The reason is that Mr. Lowery being a tobaccoist in trade he will be brought in close contact with the licensees and this is against the policy of the Government.

While Mr. Hanna does not reflect in any way upon the personality of Mr. Lowery, the Provincial Secretary says in explanation of the resignation, "The policy of the Government from the outset has been to avoid appointing to liquor license commissions men, who, from the nature of their business are necessarily brought into close relations with the licensees. In the appointment of the board for Temiskaming, Mr. Lowery was recommended for the commission without the knowledge on the part of those submitting his name of the adoption of this policy. Mr. Lowery, while no doubt a good man personally, is in the tobacco trade. This fact in itself, makes it impossible for him to continue on the board. He has, therefore, withdrawn."

DOME ROAD TO BE CONSTRUCTED AT ONCE

Tisdale Council Make Slight Change --New License Fees--Schumacher Fire Department

The Council of the Township of Tisdale decided at their meeting Wednesday night to proceed at once with the construction of the Dome Road, according to the amended suggestions laid out by the Engineer.

A by-law was prepared for this last year and on going over the ground again the Council thought that by deviating a little from the original plan a better road could be made and at the same time at a little less cost. The change in the plan would not affect the first end in view and in fact the alteration adopted would practically be more beneficial.

Those present at the meeting on Wednesday night deciding upon this course and dealing with other business of routine were Reeve Cook in the chair, and Councillors S. Kennedy, C. A. See, A. E. Dunn, and D. Ostrasser.

The \$40,000 Debenture by-law No. 14 was read for the second and third time and carried.

In dealing with the Fire Department of Schumacher it was decided that the sum of \$127.00 be expended on a building for the apparatus of that organization. At the same time the agreement offered by the McIntyre Mines for furnishing power

for the Schumacher people in case of fire was submitted and accepted.

Some time ago two chemical engines were ordered by the Council from the Seagrave people of Walkerville, immediate delivery being then required because it was just at that time the necessity was most urgent. It was pointed out to the council Wednesday night, however, that the time for delivery had now over expired and indeed also the urgency of the need for the engines.

This was in connection with an intimation from the Walkerville firm that they now had one engine ready and would have another in a very short time. As it is some two or three months since they were required the Council decided not to now purchase them and the order was therefore cancelled because delivery had not been given in the time promised.

Some time during the next week those requiring licenses for pool rooms, cigar sales, etc., will receive a copy of the new list of fees, which have been drawn up by the Council for this year and the gathering in of these license fees will be gone after as soon as possible.

en off at almost any place at all. The assertion is made by Mr. Gamble that there must have been over 100 native gold discoveries, among which the following properties are included,—Jefferson, Knox, McDonald and Caswell.

In regard to access to West Shining Tree it should be mentioned that a line of gasolines runs from Raoul on the C. N. R. The Government have placed in dams with the result that only one portage is necessary before Shining Tree is reached. One of the chief reasons in the opinion of Mr. Gamble for the district not going ahead quicker than is the present case is because most of those interested seem to be waiting for purchasers prior to going in for taking samples. This means that quite a lot of work will yet require to be done before the particular section of the country attains the standard to which it would appear it is entitled.

At the Hudson Bay Mine in Gowganda drifting has been carried on from the 98 foot level and excellent ore met with. It is the intention of the management to cease further drifting, however, and proceed at once with sinking another 100 feet, a staff of over 30 men being engaged in the work.

Other companies referred to by Mr. Gamble were the South Bay Mining Co., who have excellent ore, the Mann property, which according to the returned prospector, is "certainly a mine," and the Boyd Gordon where a gang are working under Capt. Rogers.

At the Hewitt Gowganda over half a dozen men are working and the shaft is down about 10 feet. Some fine samples of silver have been produced and in fact were located in large chunks at both sides of the shaft. The Miller Lake-O'Brien and the Millerett have also made good finds.

A recent deal concerning the Willings property on the Montreal River has just been reported as completed. Although the exact figures cannot be stated it is believed the amount of purchase was round \$25,000 and the last payment having been made the purchasers intend to go ahead and develop the property.

On his journey out Mr. Gamble heard at Elk Lake that it was likely the Otisse would soon be re-commencing operations. From observation also he gathered that real estate in Elk Lake was beginning to show a turn for the advantage to holders of good lots on the west side. Mr. A. A. Cole of the T. & N. O. was among visitors noticed at Elk Lake, although it was not ascertained definitely just what his purpose was in paying a visit.

Wrestling at The Majestic

There was quite a good attendance at the Majestic Theatre in South Porcupine on the 24th, when the holiday was taken advantage of by Cim Huddleson to present a number of wrestling and boxing bouts. The arrangements were in the hands of Joe Carr and the chief attraction was expected to be E. Tremblay of Montreal, champion lightweight wrestler of the world.

Tremblay came here to wrestle two local lightweights, but consented to meet a heavyweight provided the latter would come properly up to the mark and actually wrestle. W. Church proved the opponent in this case for a thirty minutes encounter. Tremblay, however, had no opportunity to exhibit his skill for the reason that Church would not make any proper attempt to wrestle and accordingly the half hour elapsed without a throw. Tremblay then met George Cleverly and succeeded in throwing him in 16 minutes, this bout proving the attraction of the evening.

In the boxing events W. Walsh won out after an excellent exhibition against Kid Lawrence, who was considerably heavier. Monahan and Purcell, both local lightweights, met in an encounter which soon concluded, as in the second round Monahan was declared victor on a foul.

Concerning coming events it is learned that Tremblay is prepared to come here again and wrestle John Dewar or any outside man at his own weight in the world and the early future may see another visit from him.

No definite date has been fixed by J. Huddleson for his next program, but it is hoped to make arrangements with W. Driscoll of Milwaukee and Alf. Lynch of Quebec to put up an exhibition. On the 24th some confusion reigned in regard to arrangements for spectators but this will all be cleared on the next occasion and everything carried out in order.
