## Vigorous Campaign for 228th Battalion

A number of officers of the 228th Battalion were in town last week to attend the meeting at the Majestic Theatre, where a vigorous campaign was launched in aid of recruiting for the above Battalion. Several very able speeches were delivered and one or two very stirring patriotic vocal selections given. There was considerable disappointment when it was learned that Col. Earchman was unable to be present owing to having received a wire to report in Toronto that night, but Major Lowe promised those present that the Colonel and also the regimental band would pay the camp a visit in the near future. Sergt. Mulloy, veteran of the South African war was also absent. It was pointed out by Lieut. Curry that as a whole Canada was not doing her share in comparison with the other colonies, and that up to date the figures of those who had enlisted were approximately 170,000 British born, 78,000 Canadian born, and 13,800 foreign born, including Americans. Mr. Miller, of Timmins, who sang "We'll Never Let the Old Flag Fall" was greeted with great applause as also was Mr. Guere when he rendered "Good Luck to the Boys of the Allies." The National Anthem concluded a very successful and enjoyable evening.
