**IN THE MAIL BAG**  
From the Front and Elsewhere

France, April 6, 1916.

A. G. Brough, Timmins, Ont.

Dear Cousin,—I was certainly some surprised to get a letter from you but it was welcome I can tell you, as I always like to hear from anyone from the North.

I was over here about two weeks when I received your letter which was sent on from Hazelton Downs.

We certainly had a good time in England although we had a lot of work to get through, but the men from the North always have a good time and make themselves at home wherever they go.

I was up to London three times and believe me it is some village, but no place for a stranger to go at night as it is pitch dark.

I was also up to Shorncliffe taking a course and I saw some of the boys from home. I also saw Billy McIntyre, from Haileybury, here the other day and was in hopes that I would see Lloyd and Art before this but have been unable to do so as yet.

We have been over here quite a while now and we go into the trenches every day providing there is work for us to do and I have never seen it when there was not. We are attached to the Canadian Engineers but I do not think for long.

Dick Phayre, Frank Fettes, Bill Busfield, Carmichael, and a lot of the Timmins boys were quarantined with measles when we left so they had to stay and we received in their place a draft of the 66th Battalion recruited in Nova Scotia. We are living in hopes that Dick and his bunch will rejoin us, but at present they are at the base at East Landing, Kent, England.

I am writing this in a farm yard where we are staying, and it is less than two miles behind our first line trenches, and there are batteries of guns not 100 yards from me and they have been pounding as fast as they can, and that is going some.

There has been a little excitement from midnight last night and we have been standing ready to move to the front at a moment's notice.

We have had only the one casualty in "D" Co. and poor old Sergeant "Pink" Joy, from Swastiki, got it right through the abdomen.

We have three in the hospital one officer, one sergeant-major and a private.

Now, Sandy, I must close as I have to go over and see that the men get their supper O.K.

Bill Curtis is our quartermaster-sergeant. You will remember him when he was at the Hollinger.

Tell Harry James that I received his letter to-day and will answer soon.

Have been two hours at this letter so I will close now with love to all.
