France, April 6, 1916.

Dear Cousin.- I was certainly some surprised to get a letter from you but it was welcome I can tell you, as I always like to hear from anyone from

was over here about two weeks when I received your letter which was sent on from Hazeley Downs.

We certainly had a good time in England aithough we had a lot of work to get through, but the men from the North always have a good time and make themselves at home wherever they go.

I was up to London three times and believe me it is some village, but no place for a stranger to go at night as it is pitch dark.

I was also up to Shorneliffe taking a course and I saw some of the boys P. H. MOORE, Bridgewater, N.S. from home. I also saw Billy MeIntyre, from Haileybury, here the other day and was in hopes that I would see Lloyd and Art before this but have been unable to do so as yet.

We have been over here quite a mises in the Municipality of Timmins while now and we go into the trenches every day providing there is regular schedule ones, but were inwork for us to do and I have never dulged in by a few of the members seen it when there was not. We are to try out the new traps and grounds attached to the Canadian Engineers but I do not think for long.

Dick Phayre, Frank Fettes, Bill cellent. Bushfield, Carmichael, and a lot of the Timmins boys were quarantined with measles when we left so they had to stay and we received in their place a draft of the 66th Battalion recruited in Nova Scotia.
