Teck Swastika Working 25 Men

It has been reported that the Teck Swastika Mining and Development Company of Swastika has commenced work on a large scale and that the 25 men at work on the properties are daily showing up rock and veins that are all that may be desired in the way of good mining property. On one of the claims, near Beatrice Lake, they have just found a vein that gives promise of becoming of great value and further stripping will undoubtedly reveal an ore body of considerable magnitude. This is only one more to the already large number of veins that have been encountered on the property and there is reason to believe that this company will become an important one in the mining district of Swastika in the near future.

After Diamonds In Ungava District

Diamonds in Ungava is now the word, and diamond rumors which have been floating about northern mining camps for some months now begin to take tangible shape. Last week a prospecting party passed through North Bay en route for Ungava where one of the party is said to have previously uncovered rich diamond deposits and brought out samples of genuine sparklers. The party represents a syndicate organized in Montreal and Ottawa by Jos. Grant, of Ottawa, an experienced pathfinder and prospector of the north country, who made the original discovery. He is accompanied on his return journey north by J. J. Roberts, of Ottawa, and J. J. Cummings, of Montreal, and the entire party will consist of seven white men and four Indians, carrying four tons of supplies, and will go to Cochrane and proceed to Ungava via Fredericton and Moose River to Moose Factory, where a Hudson Bay steamer has been chartered and will be awaiting the party, which will be conveyed to Riverport House and thence to East Main River, which is in the vicinity of the discovery. It is expected that New York is also on the ground and satisfied that diamond possibilities there are good enough to warrant the expenditure of a large sum of money in sending in men and supplies for development work. The samples brought out are said to have been very favorably reported on.

Active Work In Swastika

Active work will be carried on on many properties throughout the Swastika district this summer, and already the development accomplished has shown up good indications on properties which up to this time were to be classed as prospects only. Several new discoveries have been made, and this in itself has given a decided impetus to the whole district. The Teck Swastika Mining Company announce that they will begin prospecting in the immediate future, and will employ a large number of men at stripping and prospecting. There are sixteen claims in this group, including some well-known properties. The Kirkland Lake district is rapidly coming to the front, and there are already several claims there on which promising discoveries have been made in the early development work.

HUNDRED MEN TO LAY DOME ROAD

Tisdale Council Meeting---Licenses For Dogs ---More Sidewalks to Be Laid--Other Business Transacted

The Tisdale Township Council held their usual weekly meeting on Wednesday evening, when Reeve Cook presided over a full attendance of members.

The new list of licenses which has just been issued was slightly amended and added to. In the case of an application to sell soft drinks it was decided that this must also be accompanied by one for cigarettes and tobacco to make the license for the year \$45.

It will be gratifying news to those license holders who paid for last year to learn that on motion it was resolved to allow them the first quarter of this year off their amount.

In regard to fees for licenses the first pool table in pool rooms will only require \$15 instead of \$20 and for each extra table \$5 instead of \$10. An addition to places requiring licenses was made in the form of shooting galleries which will have to pay out \$10.

The Dome road would have been the scene of a busy gang of between 60 and 100 men Thursday morning had there not been such a heavy downpour of rain. This was in accordance with the council's decision to go right ahead with the work.

Those who own canines round town will have to dig down for an annual fee if they wish to retain them in the Township. For keeping a bitch the fee of \$2 annually will be payable and for a dog the sum of \$1.

A plan of land adjoining the Timmins Township and owned by Capt. H. T. Munn and Capt. Blacklock was submitted to the Council for their approval. After examination this was approved and the Reeve and Clerk instructed to sign same.

It was decided that the Court of Revision be held in Wilson's Hall on June 18th at one o'clock for the hearing of appeals in the Township.

The concluding business of the council was in regard to laying of sidewalks, following applications which had been received from residents. It was decided to lay 250 feet of plank on the south side of Bloor west from Brown, and to lay corduroy north of Bruce on Main street, while a crossing will in all likelihood be laid to the Anglican church.

NEW CONTROL OF POWER PLANT

J. H. Black Manager For New Syndicate Covering Cobalt and Porcupine Plants

The Porcupine Power Company, with a generating station at Sandy Falls, has sold out to the Wawatam Falls Syndicate, the President of which is Lorne McGibbon, and in which Mr. David Fasken is interested. The Porcupine Power Company is now the only concern supplying current in the Porcupine camp, and has as its customers nearly all the mines in the Pearl Lake section. It can supply at present 2,800 horsepower, and it is loaded to capacity. It was formerly controlled by the Timmins-McMartin-Dunlop syndicate, but the promoters of the Hollinger only went into the power project as a side line. The rates for power have just been raised. J. H. Black, General Manager of the Northern Ontario Light & Power Co., will have financial control. Mr. Fasken, of course, represents the Cobalt and Haileybury lighting interests, so that the deal embraces the whole northern country.

TERRIBLE RAILROAD BLASTING FATALITY

Eight Men Killed on C. N. R. ---Six More Were Seriously Injured

Eight men were killed and six men in the General hospital badly injured is the terrible tale of an accident which occurred in a construction camp for the Canadian Northern railway, six miles east of Stone's Corner, Perth road, 25 miles from Kingston, at 4.45 o'clock last Saturday afternoon. The men were working in a rock cut and met death as the result of a premature explosion of black powder used to blast rock. Of the eight killed all were Roumanians with the exception of Prescott Northrup, aged 35, walking boss for the two miles of road in the vicinity, whose home is in New Brunswick. Northrup was engaged in setting off the blast and his body was blown to pieces. All that was found of him was one hand with his working glove on and parts of his clothing. Eighteen men were working in the cut. They were loading a 30-foot hole when the powder exploded before the time set for it, through some cause at present unknown.

St. Pauls Church South Porcupine

Before very long, if present indications are to be taken as any criterion, St. Paul's Anglican Church at South Porcupine should be in a good condition so far as congregation is concerned and also the building for worshipping in.

At a meeting held the other evening over which the Rector, Rev. G. W. Wakefield, presided, there were present Messrs. C. B. Morgan, J. Underhill, Frisbee, Seli, Thomas and Lawrence. The officers of the church for the ensuing year were elected as follows: Rector's warden, Mr. Seli; people's warden, J. Underhill; sidesmen, Messrs. Frisbee, Ferguson, Thomas, Lawrence and Morgan.

It was decided to organize a bee who would carry out the very necessary work of clearing up the church lot and secure more chairs, an organ stool, erect a platform, place a sign outside the building with the name of St. Paul's inscribed and give the exterior a coat of paint.

At present only one service each Sunday morning is held and so far the attendances have been satisfactory. It is the intention to have electricity installed, however, and as soon as this is accomplished an effort will be made to hold evening services also.

One urgent need in order to see an increase in attendances is the laying of a sidewalk on the same side as the church and as reported in another column the Township gave instructions at their meeting this week for this need to be carried out.
