

BASEBALL TOURNAMENT VERY SUCCESSFUL

So. Porcupine New Grounds Opened Two Games Played. Large Crowd at Dance.

Following up the preparations which had been made for the baseball tournament at South Porcupine on the legal holiday last Monday there were naturally many expressions of disappointment when the early hours of morning broke with about as heavy a downpour of rain as could be the case.

The clerk of the weather, however, changed in his temperament later and although the first match of the day scheduled for morning did not come according to this the sun became strong and a strong wind helped to dry up the ground so that telephonic arrangements were soon carried into effect and Schumacher, Schumacher and the Dome teams promised to journey to South Porcupine.

THE REEVE PITCHES.

At about two o'clock, therefore, a pretty good assembly was to be seen at the new ball ground. Many expressions of opinion were heard on the excellent ground which had been acquired thanks to the energetic efforts of most members of the South Porcupine organization and the very practical support tendered by the Tisdale council in placing men and teams to work on the ground.

Before actual play was commenced Reeve Cook of the Township of Tisdale pitched to Councillor S. Kennedy by way of declaring the ground open and then W. Hatch took charge of the first and opening game between Schumacher and the Dome.

300 SPECTATORS.

According to the number of tags disposed of as shown by financial results of the game receipts nearly three hundred enthusiasts patronized the tournament. THE BALL GAMES.

Four teams participated in the ball games. Schumacher and the Dome first met at two o'clock before a crowd of nearly 300. It had been originally arranged that out of two preliminary matches a play off was to follow between the winning teams, but owing to lack of time on account of the late start this was found impossible. The results showed that the Schumacher were victors over the Dome by 6-5, while the South Porcupine representatives won from Porcupine 11-6.

Only two home runs were secured in the two games, these being credited to Emery of the Schumacher and G. M. Rounds of South Porcupine.

Timmins New Hotel Opened

With the opening of the splendid hotel known as The Goldfields at Timmins accommodation has been made for all classes of visitors to that section of the Porcupine country.

The hotel, which has been built by the townsite company, is under management by W. J. McLean, formerly of the Kingston at South Porcupine.

This new hotel which has been erected in a convenient situation close to the depot and overlooking one of the prettiest sections of the district, has been planned in a thoroughly modern manner with every convenience.

The dining and public rooms on the ground floor are large and commodious and every accommodation is provided for ladies. Baths are provided on each floor while the large balconies overlooking Gillies Lake are a very attractive feature of the hotel which bids fair to become a popular summer home for many people in the district whose business keeps them in the Pearl Lake section of the camp.

Hollinger Reserve Good Assays

The results being attained at the Hollinger Reserve are very satisfactory to date and of considerable promise. Since the installation of a compressor the work of sinking the shaft has been progressing rapidly. This has now reached a depth of nearly 90 feet and is being continued to 100 feet, when a crosscut will be made north and south to get underneath the veins showing on the surface. At least 25 feet of crosscutting will have to be done before these veins are reached.

The shaft was put down on one of the best showings on this property. The vein left the shaft at a depth of 40 feet but at 65 feet stringers appeared in the side of the shaft which widened out to a seven-foot vein at the depth of 80 feet. Samples taken across the vein gave average assays of \$19.
