

**OUTSIDE INTEREST
IN CAMP EXTENDED**

**Increased Enquiries Received By
Local Brokers From Large
Financial Houses**

That outside capital is again commencing to take an interest in Porcupine is evidenced by the unusual number of inquiries which are being received by the local firm of A. S. Fuller & Co., Stock and Mining Brokers, at South Porcupine.

Mr. Fuller reports that in the past ten days his office has received inquiries from four very large financial houses in London, England, having in view the purchase of mining properties in this section. Mr. Fuller also states that large New York interests are again casting their eyes towards Porcupine with the view of future investment. The Advance representative was shown recent letters which indicate that a large amount of money would soon be invested in the camp by New York capitalists.

Mr. Fuller is firmly of the opinion that before the end of the year the entire Porcupine camp will enter upon an era of activity greater than ever before.

**Baseball League
To Be Formed**

In order to discuss the question of a baseball league for the Porcupine district a meeting was held over the See Drug Store on Monday evening when there were present from the different clubs the following representatives: Messrs. **DEVELOPING AND
PROSPECTIVE MINES**

**Porcupine Has Pay Roll of 2000
Men on 40 Workings Con-
cerns of Districts**

In the Porcupine district proper there are twenty-nine prospective and partially developed mines, in addition to a dozen smaller syndicates operating now, as compared with fifty-three last December. These are as follows: Three Nations, Roches, Seneca Porcupine, Hughes, Mulholland, Achilles, Crown Chartered, Smith Vet, Hudson Bay Porcupine, Winkler, Jones, Montreal Shamrock, Dome Extension, Big Dome, North Dome, Dome Lake, East Dome, Standard, Success, Vipond, McEnany, Moneta, Hollinger, McIntyre, Pearl Lake Gold Mines, Jupiter, Plenaurnum, Gold Crest and the Pletch Syndicate.

In the Turnbull Territory, in addition to the preparations for summer work by the Huronian Prospecting and Engineering Syndicate, there are six small syndicates operating, while in the Carmen, McArthur, Price and Byers a dozen other small concerns are proving up property.

There are a total of 40 working concerns in the entire district, now carrying a pay roll of 2000 men.

**Stamp Mill For
Lucky Cross**

The Lucky Cross Mines of Swastika are now planning on their mill and the specification for the same have been received here. It will be in the nature of a small stamp mill which will be used to test out their ore and to find the exact treatment necessary before the larger mill is erected. It will be a five-stamp mill which will be capable of turning out from 20 to 25 tons of ore a day and will cost in the neighborhood of \$7,500.

With the ore already on the dump and that in sight there will be no reason why this mine should not be on a paying basis within a short time after the commencement of operations.

Surface work which was abandoned last winter will be resumed on the properties and many values that were not prospected to any extent will be looked into and trenching resumed.

**Three Nations
To Second Level**

Sinking the main shaft at the Three Nations Mines, Porcupine, from the 100 to the 200-foot level to get below the Huronian capping and thereby trace out the source of the many small stringers which yield rich gold in flake and nugget form has commenced. The compressor plant will be in working order within a few days and Manager Angrenau expects to be able to make the depth in thirty days.

Rich seams and stringers of quartz appear frequently in the crosscut to the north of the shaft base and it is the opinion of engineers that by getting below the slates and conglomerates, the Old Keewatin formation will be encountered and in this type of country rock it is that the experienced heads say the main strong lead lies from which the stringers offshoot.

**W. B. GUNTON REPORT
ON PORCUPINE STOCK**

**Holiday Season Often Sees Bright
--No Occasion to Be Gloomy
About the Camp.**

That "every cloud has its silver lining" may be taken to be the opinion of Wm. T. Gunton, manager of the Kenora Gold Mines, in speaking of the Porcupine stock market, for which some people anticipate a dull season.

"One of the best markets we ever had in stocks came during the holiday season," said Mr. Gunton in Toronto. "The fact that stocks are dull now owing to the development work having to be done does not mean that the holiday season may be dull. Indeed, to the contrary, this holiday season might be just the reverse of other years."

And stock tables bear out what Mr. Gunton says. Just now in general stocks average at the reasonably high mark. True, stocks in undeveloped mining properties have yet to make a mark, but considering the market in general there is apparently no occasion for deep gloom. Mr. Gunton is one of the optimists who are able to distinguish the clouds with a silver lining when only a bare portion of the edges are coming to view.

Free Delivery**

It is the intention of the Canadian Express Company at South Porcupine to commence a free delivery of parcels passing through their hands as soon as arrangements can be made for the carrying out of the project. The extensive business which they have been doing is a strong indication of the gradual increase of business in the camp as well as a bright outlook for the early future. According to Mr. J. Hadwen, the local manager, the extent of business which has passed through their hands during the past month has trebled over any previous month and the question of securing more clerical assistance has been put forward by him to headquarters. Mr. H. C. M. Porritt, of the Canadian Express Company, arrived in town Wednesday to go into the whole matter and it is expected that the public will benefit considerably by the arrangements decided upon.
