MANY TOWN MATTERS WERE UNDER DISCUSSION

By Timmins Board of Trade—Small Attendance But Numerous Topics Brought Forward

- Week End Tickets.
- Tourist Tickets.
- Auditors' Report.
- Condition of Streets.
- Installing Water.
- Telephone Charges.

In a nutshell the above were the topics for discussion which took up the time of the Timmins Board of Trade at their meeting on Friday evening last when the following were present:—

President Ostrasser, in the chair, and Messrs. Laflamme, Dr. McInnis, T. King, H. Cullen, Nowell, Brazeau and Petrosky. It was mentioned by Secretary F. C. H. Clunas that several counter attractions that evening no doubt accounted for the small attendance.

In accordance with instructions at a previous meeting the Secretary had written Mr. A. J. Parr of the T and N O regarding weekend tickets and tourist tickets to Timmins and the replies received from Mr. Parr were read to the meeting as follows:—

Week End Tickets

"I beg to acknowledge your favor of May 27th in which you ask that the week-end excursion tickets be made good to return on Saturday instead of being restricted as at present, so as not to be good to return on either Friday or Saturday. I beg to advise you that wherever these week end tickets are in effect on the railroads they are made good on p.m. trains Friday and on all trains Saturday and Sunday, and not good for return either Friday or Saturday or later than Monday. In view of the fact that this is a universal arrangement we feel that for the sake of uniformity, we could not well depart from this practice."

Tourist Fares.

"When giving our representation on summer tourist fares to the various United States and Canadian roads, we certainly included Timmins as per copy of schedule attached and on checking up C P R Tariff effective May 1st I find they have given Timmins representation but Grand Trunk in their tariff have apparently overlooked Timmins. This feature has been called to the attention of Mr. W. S. Cookson, A. G. P. A. Grand Trunk, Montreal, asking that he show Timmins in supplement at once. I can assure you that it is our intention that Timmins, as well as all other points, be given representation in summer tourist fares."

The Chairman—Well, that is satisfactory at any rate. Lots of people when coming over the Grand Trunk before could only check their baggage by tourist ticket as far as South Porcupine.

Good Financial Position

In submitting the Auditors' report the Secretary stated that there had been received in cash from the members of the Board, \$215.89 which with other receipts made a total of \$224.69. The balance in cash at June 1st was \$182.25 and there was yet to be received \$55.00 for outstanding membership fees. It was decided to notify the latter that their fees were still unpaid.

"The Board is in a fairly good position" commented the Chairman. The Clerk—"I think we have about sixty-five paid up members."

The Streets Question

A committee was appointed at a previous meeting to meet the Town Council on the matter of streets and necessary improvements. It was suggested that some definite plan should be drawn up by them to go to the Council with.

"Everybody knows just how the streets are" said the Chairman "and if kept in their present condition they are liable to drive people away from the town, especially on a windy day. I think we should pass a resolution requesting the Council to compel everyone to put in a water system."

Water Connections

Dr. McInnis asked if the Council

had sent out any information yet regarding the selling of bonds and Councillor Laflamme replied that he could not say whether they had or not. The Chairman remarked that in the case of the sidewalk last year the matter had to be practically forced through.

Mr. King—Well, this will have to be forced as well.

Mr. Brazeau—Would it not be possible to take up a subscription to have the work done?

The Chairman thought they should not have to do that. They were paying taxes and not getting these local improvements. "The assessed value of this town is roughly \$300,000," he said "which is a very large assessment."

The Clerk—"That is subject to appeal of course."

Mr. King thought that resolutions from that Board would strengthen the Council's hands. This was when the water connections was being discussed. On the motion of Dr. King was decided that "the Council be asked to pass a by-law enforcing property owners from the station to Dalton's Hotel and from the Goldfields Hotel to the Bank saloon to have water connections from the main to their respective lots before the roads are put into repair and thus save further expense at a subsequent date."

Telephone Rates

Mr. King asked if it would be any use negotiating with the Porcupine Telephone Lines to cut their rate down. \$60.00 was a large sum for a business phone per year, and \$40.00 for a house phone. It was a regular oldup he thought.

Dr. McInnis—No business man would kick at paying \$40.00. What they would lose in the rate would be made up by more people putting in phones.

On motion of T. King seconded by E. Laflamme it was asked that the Telephone Company seeking them to consider the question of subscription for business and private phones. At the same time it was decided also to write the Northern Ontario Light and Power Company as to a reduction of lighting rates for the Town of Timmins.

A Timmins Magistrate

The question of appointment of a Police Magistrate for Timmins was broached by President Ostrasser who remarked that there was no Police Magistrate in the Town and nothing more had been heard of it since the visit of Premier Hearst and his party. He thought the Town was entitled to such an appointment. They should have a man appointed here to act as Police Magistrate. As it was they only had two J.P.'s and matters were held up which could be easily cleared if the appointment was made. The matter was not further discussed.

Stamping Lots

Mr. T. M. Wilson drew the attention of the Board to the advisability of compelling owners of lots in town to stamp and clear them. He instance two or three. Where they were not built on they could well afford to have this done. It would improve the appearance of the town and also be a great help in case of fire. If they asked the Council to take this up with the owners he thought it would be done. It would simply fall on the people themselves, accordingly he would make a proposal to this effect.

Dr. McInnis—The trouble is people who have built on lots have them cleared but those who have not built are away. I understand some people who own these do not want to sell but are holding for higher prices.

The resolution was passed. Dr. McInnis being the seconder. Incorporated with it was also reference to streets and lanes being kept clear as it was considered an annoyance and fire menace.

Change Meeting Dates

Just before adjournment of the meeting it was decided that the days for the Board of Trade meetings in future would be the second and fourth Fridays in each month instead of the first and third Fridays because of meeting the Fire Department in the matter of using the Council chamber.

WHY NOT SCHUMACHER BASEBALL TEAM?

There are certain enthusiastic baseball players in and around Schumacher who would like to see some plan devised and carried out whereby games could be arranged with teams in South Porcupine. The local league there consists of three teams and it is thought possible that a number of friendly encounters could be made up. Possibly if the matter was taken up in a proper way and the Schumacher fans and players got together something good in the way of sport may result and any publicity which the Advance can give the organizers will be only too cheerfully extended.
