## SOUTH PORCUPINE REPULSE 228th IN FIRST ATTACK SAT.

The 228th baseball team went down to defeat in their first encounter in the Porcupine camp, before a fairly large crowd, on Saturday afternoon, at the hands of the South Porcupine-Dome combination.

Kelly decorated the mound for the visitors in the first five innings, but was replaced by Cook in the sixth. The latter is a former Princeton star and later performed in major league company.

Brisson started the fireworks for South Porcupine and was replaced by Gray in the 7th innings. Gray is also a Princeton man, and although not a class-mate, was for a short time an understudy of Cook's, who at that time had an established reputation as a twirler.

Thomas, at 3rd for South Porcupine, is also a Princeton graduate, and a friend of Cook.

Some costly errors behind Kelly, together with a few timely hits cost the 228th six runs. While during the first three innings in which Cook officiated, he was invincible, in the ninth two passes and four errors let in four more tallies for South Porcupine.

Brisson seemed to have the game very well in hand, allowing only four runs in seven innings.

The 228th secured one run off Gray in the eighth inning. George looks

good for one more season; this being his first appearance on the mound this season.

If you see the new moon thru glass you will have ill luck thru the month. If you see it in the open and turn the silver upside down in your pocket you will be wealthy for the month.

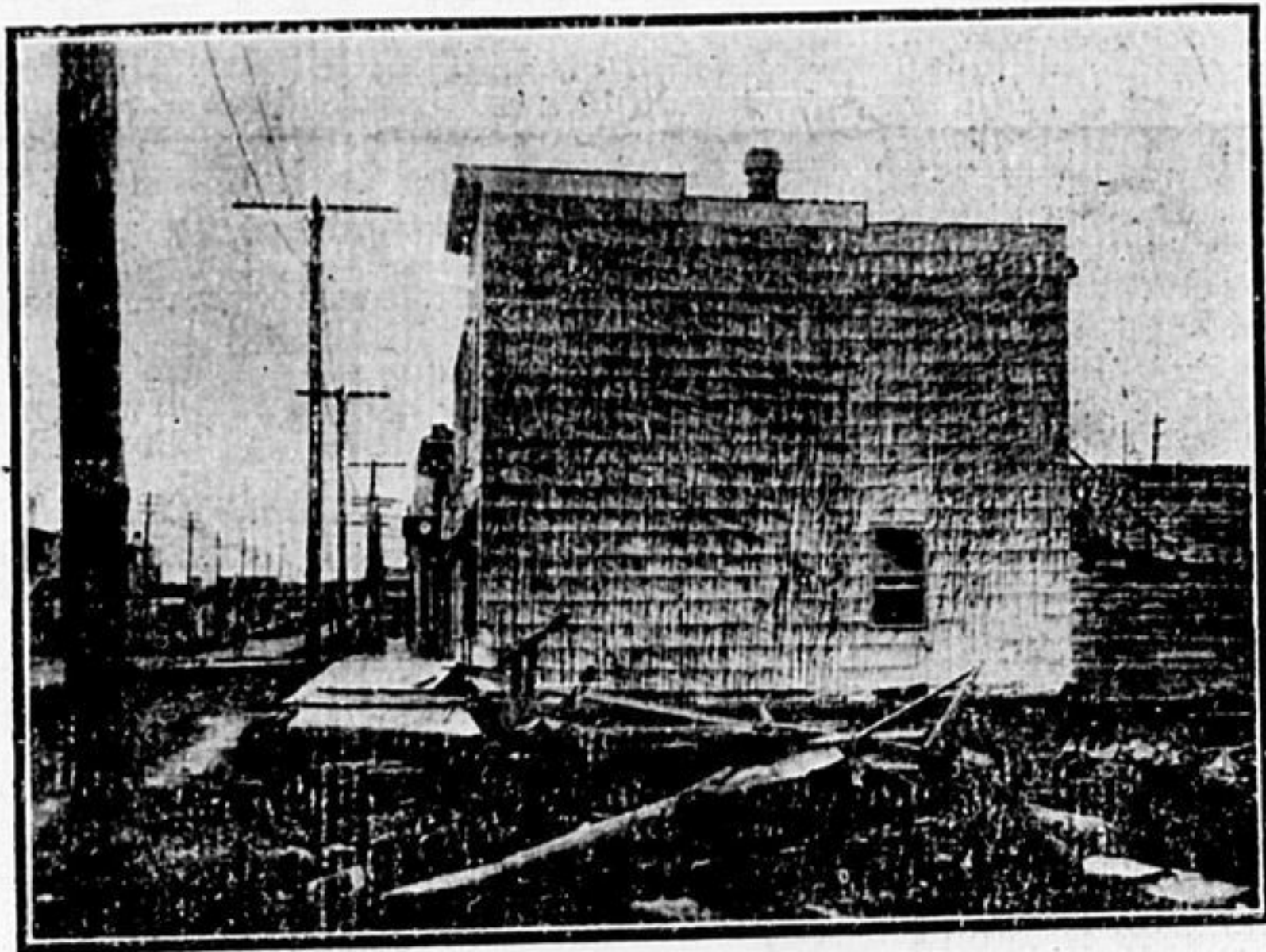

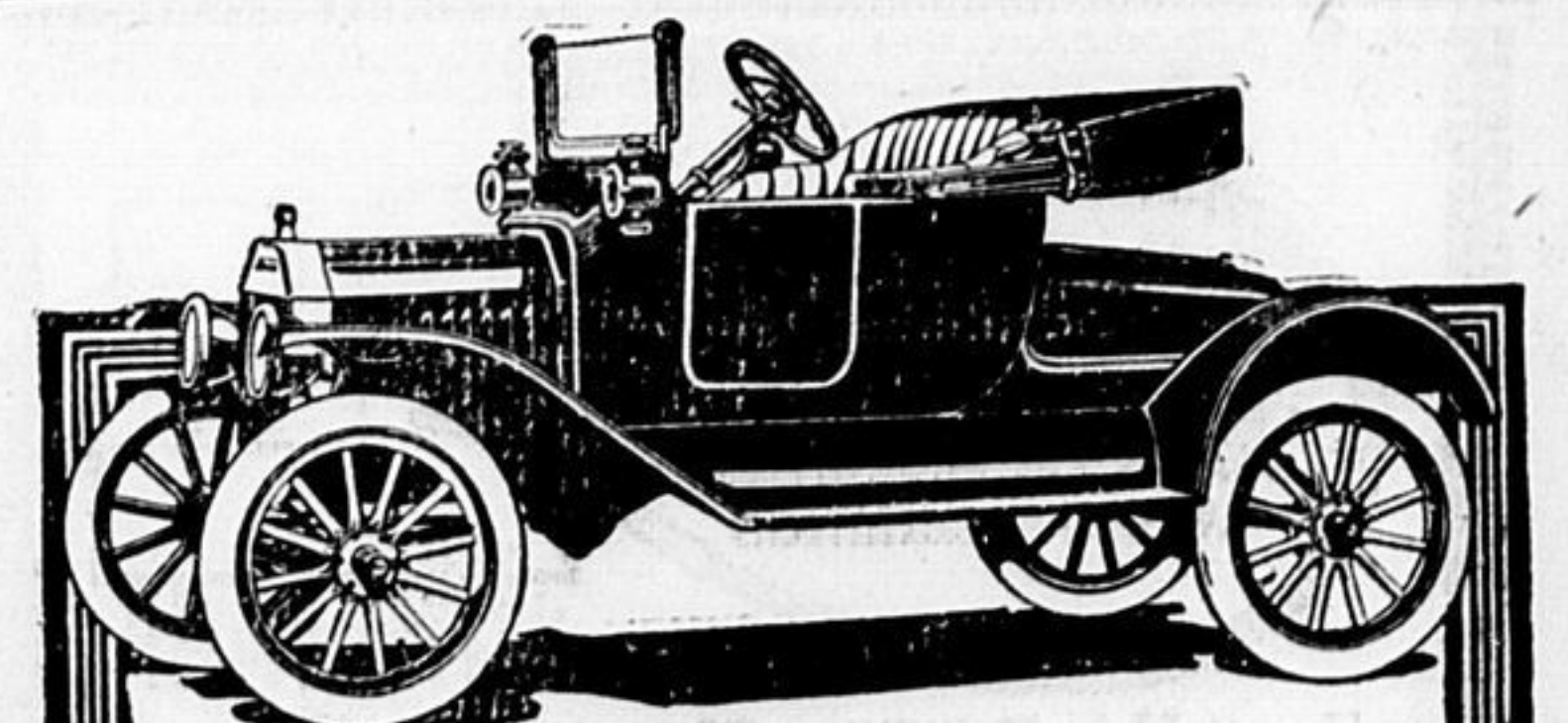
