OUR CEMETERY

As village comment runs, there is a deplorable condition of things at our village cemetery at Deadman's Point. This was strongly made apparent at the time of the recent burial of the remains of Peter Blue. It seems many of the bodies interred there last summer immediately succeeding July's fire were hastily covered up under conditions not the most favorable, and the settling of snow and ice about the coffin boxes, and frost's incident upheaval, have made them bare in part to the action of the summer's sun and winds. This is subjecting them to early decay and disintegration, and suggests that when the time comes for removal to a permanent resting place the task will be both trying and expensive, for as we understand it this ground is not owned but leased by the village. This subject seems to be met for the consideration of the Board of Trade and the action of the local clergy, and ought to have early attention.

It is the more urgent at this time since it is proposed to fittingly observe the anniversary on the 11th instant of the great fire and the incident loss of life and suffering. If necessary, let us resolve ourselves into a committee of the whole and go forth with pick and shovel to mend the sorry condition of things there existing.

**Seriously Hurt
At Cochrane**

A Frenchman, whose name could not be learned, was seriously injured at Cochrane on Friday. He was an employe at Deaubien's mill, when an inserted tooth flew from a circular saw near which he was standing. The flying tooth struck him near the heart and plowed downward to the thigh. On Saturday physicians made an attempt to locate the piece of steel, but were unable to do so, and the injured man's condition is serious.

direct communication with one of the richest markets of its size in Ontario. It would be hard to find in Ontario land that promises better and quicker returns for the investment of labor in clearing and seeding.

Concurrently with the opening of Mountjoy township the townships of Matheson, McCart and Calvert, near to Frederickhouse Lake, and between that river and the Abitibi, have been thrown open. These contain some of the best land in the North Country and undoubtedly when it is known that they are available there will be plenty of applications. These must be made to the Crown Lands Office at Matheson. To facilitate the settler getting in and out of his land a road is being built between the Frederickhouse and the Abitibi Rivers, passing through the townships of Calvert and McCart, and it will be connected by another road which will be cut through to the station of Iron-quois Falls, thus giving the pioneer access to the railroad and the markets.

As many people are not familiar with the requirements of the homestead law, a summary taken from a compilation issued by the department of Agriculture is appended:

The townships open for sale are subdivided into lots of 320 acres, or sections of 640 acres, and according to the regulations now in force a half lot or a quarter section of 160 acres, more or less, is allowed to each applicant. The price is 50 cents an acre, payable one-fourth cash, and the balance in three annual instalments with interest at 6 per cent.

The applicant must be a male (or sole female) head of a family, or a single man over 18 years of age.

The sale is subject to the following conditions: The purchaser must go into actual and bona fide occupation within six months from date of purchase, erect a habitable house at least 16x20 feet, clear and cultivate at least 10 per cent. of the area of the land, and reside thereon for three years.

The intending purchaser should make application to the Crown Lands Agent in charge of the township in which the land is situated, and file the affidavit required, which will be sent to the department. If the land is vacant and open for sale the applicant must, upon notice from the agent, pay the first instalment of the purchase money, for which the agent will give him a receipt. The applicant has then authority to go into possession and commence the settlement duties.

Applications are not received for any public lands until they are laid out into townships, surveyed into lots and concessions, and formally opened for sale by Order-in-Council. Lands that are reported to be valuable chiefly for mines, minerals or timber, are also withheld from sale for agricultural purposes.

Nearly all the lands now open for sale are subject to timber license, which authorizes the holder of the license to cut pine and other kinds of timber. After a lot has been regularly sold, however, it drops from the license all kinds of timber except pine and the purchaser has the right to cut and use such pine trees as may be necessary for building or fencing on his land, and may also cut and dispose of all trees that he requires to remove in the actual process of clearing the land for cultivation. The pine trees so cut and disposed of are subject to the ordinary timber dues. Although the timber other than pine is dropped from timber license, after a sale of the land is carried out, the purchaser is not entitled to cut and dispose of any kind of timber until he has gone into actual bona fide occupation of the land, resided thereon continuously for six months, built a habitable house 16x20 feet, and cleared and put under cultivation two acres at least.

At the expiry of three years from the date of sale, and upon payment in full of the purchase money and interest and proof of the completion of the settlement duties required by the regulations, the purchaser is entitled to a patent for his land.

**Temiskaming
Retains Control**

The Temiskaming shareholders have voted by a large majority to retain the controlling interest in the North Dome property, acquired last fall. The result of the polling as announced by the secretary was in round numbers 600,000 shares in favor of retaining control, and 400,000 shares against.
