A New Danger To Aviators

When you take your aeroplane out for an airing next Sunday don't get gay while trying to impress the other fellow with your speed while trying to pass him, lest you encounter a similar experience to that of two lieutenants, Briez and Burlez, of the French army. Lieut. Briez had attained an altitude of 600 feet when Lieut. Burlez, passing him at a greater speed 100 feet higher in the air, forced a pocket of air downward and caused the machine driven by Lieut. Briez to lose its equilibrium. The monoplane crashed to the ground and Lieut. Briez sustained two broken legs, while his jaw was fractured and his breast also injured. The doctors in attendance, however, say he will recover.

\$100 Damages Awarded Farmer

That flying men landing in his fields damaged the crops, terrified the domestic animals, and drove off the game, was the contention of a farmer who sued several flying men. The court awarded \$100 damages, but declined a petition of the complainant that the airmen should not be allowed to fly at a height lower than six hundred feet, and also that motors should be silenced while passing over his land. This the Judge declared to be beyond the jurisdiction of the court.

Crop Outlook In the States

The Modern Miller (Cincinnati) says: Where threshing of winter wheat is under way, reports are conflicting, some being of full yields and others that the berry is thin. Rains have interfered with harvest, and in localities east of the Mississippi heavy rains are said to have damaged the wheat in the shock. Hard winter wheat is generally threshing out well. Harvesting has started on the Northwest Pacific coast, with promise of large yields.

FROM PORCUPINE

Reeve Walsh took a business trip to Haileybury this week.

Mr. Geo. McGowan left Porcupine on Wednesday for Ottawa. He expects to be away till fall.

Mr. Gordon Gauthier left on Saturday on the afternoon train for Toronto.

Mr. and Mrs. Nap. Seguin and family of the Bank Hotel leave on Tuesday next for a month's vacation in Quebec.

Mr. G. LeBlanc, manager of the Iroquois mines, left on Wednesday for New York, where he will interview the directors of the above mines.

Mr. Ohas. McInnis has had a fine verandah erected on the front of his house on Haileybury Crescent, which greatly improves the appearance of his residence. Messrs. Chapman & Topp are the builders.

A large party consisting of M. Triffle Bastien, Pres., M. Blanchett, Vice-Pres., M. Laurandau, Sec. Treas., and a number of directors and friends of the Hughes mines, will again visit Porcupine on Friday, July 12th.

Father A. Pelletier, Catholic priest of Porcupine, leaves on the pilgrimage excursion train on Tuesday for St. Anne de Beaupre, Que. During his absence his place will be taken by Father Lagravelle of North Cobalt.

A small bush fire occurred on Saturday on the outskirts of the town near the railway track that at one time bid fair to become serious, but Chief Preston and Capt. Poolock soon had a strong force of men on the spot and assisted by a powerful stream from the hose all danger was soon averted.

The building of the new Masonic temple in Haileybury Crescent was commenced on Friday last. It will be a fine and imposing structure and will be two storeys high, 30 feet wide and 48 feet long. Ungava Party Leaves Porcupine

J. D. Grant left the Mulligan House on Monday for Cochrane, where he will join E. Davis and Homer Racicot and the rest of his party who are making the trip to Ungava with him. This party is making for the same grounds as E. Davis and Mike O'Connell were when the latter unfortunately lost his life by drowning. The expedition consists of 14 men and 4 Indian guides and will proceed by the way of Hurricana river to Moose Factory, where a steamer has been chartered to take them on to their landing place. They are taking four tons of provisions with them and will purchase more en route at the Hudson Bay Co's posts. The main body will be away about 12 months, but Mr. Grant expects to return for a short trip to Porcupine in October.

The Prospectors and McArthur

A deputation of prospectors consisting of Mr. Nelson Hall, Mr. Rutherford and Mr. Pardo Thomas, waited by his able second, Mr. O. Bashaw, resident magistrate of Porcupine, on Saturday last to lay before him their complaints as to the bad means of transportation to and from the townships of McArthur and Bartlett. Mr. Gauthier received them with his usual courtesy and politeness and listened attentively to a long recital of their complaints and sympathised with them in their object. He promised to do his utmost to direct their complaints into the proper channel. As a result a number of petitions have been circulated round the camp for signatures, and it is hoped by this means to induce the government to do something toward bettering the trails or building a road and clearing the waterway, the Waterhen Creek or Foomen Creek as it is better known, of the numerous log jams, and thus doing much to lessen the number of portages the traveller by that route has to make as at present.

Mr. Rowell to Visit Porcupine

A strong committee of the most prominent men of Porcupine has been formed to receive him, and also a sports committee.
