NO VICTORY AT DOME VS. TIMMINS

Played Under Porcupine Football League Last Saturday When Result Was 2-1

The Dome and Timmins contingents again met in a league football encounter last Saturday when a drawn game was seen with a score of 2 goals each.

In the opening exchanges Timmins showed heavy pressure but the Dome defence proved difficult to get past and with a reversal of play to the other end the home team, through Bridson, sent in a clever shot which was equally cleverly saved by Len Dunford, the visiting net guardian.

First point in the game was credited to Mullen, of Timmins, during a combined rush of the Timmins forward line. Costain in the Dome goal not having much chance to clear the shot which beat him.

Some amendments, however, was soon after made by Costain who saved a couple of good shots in quick succession and although the Timmins quintette tried hard to add another point with Dome equally anxious to even up, nothing further in this line was accomplished before the whistle blew with the score thus standing.

It was shortly after the re-opening that an accident occurred which caused considerable comment not only from both sets of players but many of the spectators.

In a mixup between Wainwright and one of the Dome players the referee decided to order the first named off the ground which immediately resulted in a storm of protests being raised owing to the circumstances under which the order was given. Finally, after a few minutes discussion it was decided that Wainwright would be allowed to proceed with play.

The rush of the Dome forwards to the visiting goal meant the calling on of Dunford many times over and he proved equal to every occasion.

It was while Costain had left a most open chance through leaving his citadel that Timmins sent up their second point.

The first score for the Dome was through Silver following upon some united pressure on the part of that forward line and it was again to the credit of Silver that the Dome's second and equalizing point was secured.

Lack of Organization on Part of Timmins is Blamed for Defeat

The league fixture between the Dome and Timmins Baseball teams scheduled for July 10 at Timmins and played on a later day was not the class of ball to attract the public or enthrall the "fans."

The game was not only featured by errors out was listless throughout. However, the day being extremely hot accounted for much of the listlessness.

TEST CASE ON SUNDAY BASEBALL IN QUEBEC

Action Commenced by Lord's Day Alliance Against Managers, Players and Sporting Editors

Quebec, July 12.—An attack on Sunday ball in the Canadian League was made by the Lord's Day Alliance here to-day, when summonses were issued by Magistrate Goyette of the Hull Court, calling on Frank Shaughnessy, manager of the Ottawa ball team, and Malcolm Briece and Thomas Gorman, sporting editors of local papers, to appear in court on Tuesday next to face charges of having violated the Lord's Day Act.

Briece and Gorman are officers of the ball club.

The ball games were conducted on Dupuis Park, in Hull, and the date of offence charged is May 23.

Besides the managers and the two officers, these players have been summoned to appear before the court: Pete Powers, Arthur Lage, Sosy Dolan and Louis Peterson. They will be charged with having taken part in the game.

There are four counts against the club manager and the sporting editors, as follows: Engaged in a performance in which a fee was charged; employing persons on Sunday; advertising the game and providing a performance in a place other than a church for gain or reward.

Similar action was taken by the Lord's day Alliance a year ago, but the charges never went to court, as the prosecutions were not authorized by the attorney-general of Quebec. This time, it is understood, authorization for the charges has been given by Sir Lomer Gouin, and the alliance intends to base a test case on the above grounds.

A good deal of comment has been heard in various quarters regarding the rulings in the game of football at Dome last week and it has been stated to The Advance by more than one that a change of referees is urgent if such decisions as were given are to stand.

In sports of every description it is very seldom good policy to argue or dispute with an official's decision but even a referee is not infallible and the fact that players on both sides last Saturday agreed very decidedly that some rulings were anything but fair indicates there must have been cause for dissension.

McFarlane, of the Dome, has been suggested as an official in this capacity whose handling of the game would meet with approval generally and if the public are expected to maintain their interest in supporting the players the sooner something definite in the way of change is made by the league officials the better it will be for the game in general in the gold camp.

President Edward Barrow of the International League declared as untrue reports that the Buffalo and Jersey City clubs would be transferred to Scranton and Reading. Such a move has never been contemplated, he added. The International League, he said, is planning to return to Newark next season with prominent local men behind the club.
