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## McINTYRE EXTENSION NAME OF PEARL LAKE Since Its Acquisition by McIntyre-Porcupine Mines as Reported Last Week

The announcement made in The Advance last week that the McIntyre Porcupine Mines, Limited, had become the owners of the Pearl Lake Gold Mine for a purchase price of \$200,000 was confirmed last week end. The new company will be known as the McIntyre Extension.

Naturally those interested in the stock markets to any extent ventured many opinions as to what effect this transaction would have on both the price of McIntyre stock and the almost defunct Pearl Lake, so far as the stock market was concerned.

In a criticism regarding the policy of the McIntyre, Saturday Night of last week, says that "The market manipulation in McIntyre Porcupine Mines is attracting a good deal of attention, and not a little adverse criticism."

"There is the feeling, and it seems well founded, that the powers back of the proposition are altogether too busy mining the market at the possible expense of the mine."

Further comment is made by the weekly periodical named but according to a statement credited to Col. Hay, President of the McIntyre, the acquisition of Pearl Lake will not only mean that operations will be begun on this property almost immediately but it will strengthen the position of the McIntyre.

The Pearl Lake has been closed down for over a year and was finally placed in the Receiver's hands with outstanding liabilities of about \$225,000.

The Pearl Lake was indebted to the Cartwright interests to the extent of \$175,000. The property was purchased by the McIntyre for the liabilities but the Cartwrights, having great faith in the Pearl Lake preferred to take stock in a new company rather than a cash settlement.

Many opinions have been given as to the benefit to the McIntyre which the new deal would be and it is pointed out that it gives them the opportunity of using a shaft down 600 feet close to their own boundary.

In addition, Pearl Lake has a plant which has hitherto been rented by McIntyre. Pearl Lake has in addition what is claimed to be one of the best shafts in the camp.

When all the conditions are taken into consideration it would appear that there is no reason for delay in exploiting Pearl Lake and in working from the shaft in co-operation with these on the McIntyre property.

The new directors of the McIntyre have not yet been announced but the majority of the board will be named by the controlling company, the Porcupine McIntyre Mines.

## DAVIDSON CLAIM CAN BE WORKED Is Now Free of Litigation Following Liquidation of Crown Chartered Company

Mr. Sam Dobie, one of the original holders in the Davidson claim in Northern Tisdale and also interested in the Anchorite Mining Co., Ltd., of Delora Township, a mile and a quarter south-west of the Big Dome, is a visitor in the gold camp this week and made the Hotel Connaught at South Porcupine his headquarters.

In an announcement regarding the Davidson claim he stated that they are now clear of all litigation by the liquidation of the Crown Chartered Mining Company.

It is hoped now that the lien holders will be successful in having their property placed in the hands of some strong and reliable mining combination with the purpose of proceeding with active development.

If the claim is taken hold of in the proper manner and worked as it should be there is reason to believe that good results will be forthcoming. In the opinion of those well posted on the matter the Davidson is considered to be one of the best in the northern section of Tisdale.

Mr. Dobie has always been a firm believer in the outcome of the Porcupine Gold Camp and shown his confidence in a practical manner so that the property referred to may receive a fair measure of practical attention.

## WEST DOME TO BE RE-ORGANIZED Meeting of Shareholders on the 20th of August for Consideration of New Proposals

According to a report received in camp this week the re-organization plans in connection with West Dome are to be submitted at a meeting called for August 20th.

From what can be learned the new company will be called the West Dome Consolidated Mines with a capital of three million dollars.

One million of the capitalization will be offered to the investing public at twenty-five cents per share or better and the balance will be divided pro rata among the old shareholders.

## Claims in Delora Change Hands

One of the most recent deals in connection with the Delora Township section of claims is that in which Messrs. R. E. McDonald, B. Crookery and T. James were the partners. This is situated right next to what was formerly known as the Pike Lake Gold Mines but now changed from that name.

The claim of the trio named has been sold within the past week but no figures have been made public by those concerned nor any details of the negotiations.

## SHIPMENT OF HIGH GRADE FROM PRESTON Car of \$200 Ore Expected to be Sent From Delora Property in Week or Ten Days

Arrangements are being made for the shipment of a car of high grade ore from the Preston property situated on the line between Tisdale and Delora and half a mile south of the Big Dome. The shipment will probably be made next week and it is estimated that the value of the ore will run about \$200 to the ton.

This will be very good news to the increasing number of those interested in the two sections referred to and be an impetus for further development being carried on at other properties in the neighbourhood.

The Preston property was originally purchased by the Preston East Dome people for the sum of \$250,000. This company made a first payment of \$25,000 but owing to financial stringency were not able to carry out their further obligations.

The property thus lapsed to the

present owners who are represented by Mr. William Offer and who is directing operations at the Preston.

It is stated that Mr. Offer may have the car ready for consigning in a week or ten days, and this will be the fourth car of high grade from the property which is showing many signs of promise.

It has always been the opinion of mining men acquainted with that particular section that the Preston is probably one of the most promising prospects in the district where it is situated. It is about a year since the last car of high grade was got together and shipped.

The present high grade is being produced from two new veins which have never been previously opened up. The property is located in porphyry with quartz veins running north and south through the formation.

## MINING BREVITIES.

At what is known as the Dr. McLean Gold Company on the other side of Gillies Lake, work is being done on a veteran claim in charge of Max Gunter. Lumber was sent out to the property this week for the erection of camps and other buildings.

Mr. W. G. Edwards, who returned to Vanwest, Ohio, from the gold camp this week after his first visit was very optimistic as to the outlook for the future and will return to go more into the matter of investing at a later date.

Col. Hay, President of the McIntyre Porcupine Gold Mines accompanied by Mr. C. A. Banks, arrived in camp last Tuesday and left for Hailybury on the noon train to-day.

H. H. Hardinge, of the Hardinge Conical Mill Co., New York, is a visitor at the Goldfields Hotel, arriving in camp yesterday.

## Brokers Postpone Trip Till Sept. 3rd.

The proposed visit of prominent brokers from various cities of Canada and the States which was to have been seen at the gold camp this week end has been postponed until Friday, September 3rd, according to a Toronto message sent The Advance to-day.

This course was decided upon at a special meeting of the members of the Standard Stock and Mining Exchange held in Toronto this week. The party will leave Toronto on the Friday named by special train and arrive in the gold camp the day following. They will return in time to be in Toronto again the day after Labor Day.

The party, in addition to Toronto brokers will include representatives from New York, Boston, Chicago, Philadelphia and Buffalo and as it will be an initial visit by some of these to the gold camp an endeavor will be made to show everything worth seeing and a loyal welcome extended the visitors.

## Dome Directors Declare Dividend

A despatch received in Timmins to-day by Homer L. Gibson states that a meeting of the Directors of the Dome Mines Company, Limited, was held in New York this morning when it was decided that a dividend of 5 per cent. be paid quarterly.

## TO WORK MARTIN CLAIMS IN TISDALE

Mr. C. L. Sherrill, of Buffalo, who, as reported last week was a visitor in camp in connection with mining properties in which he is interested, returned the latter part of last week, but it is stated that he will return next week with the intention of opening up the Martin claims in the Tisdale Township, at the back of the Rea Mine.

## Working Steadily At Gold Reef

In order to satisfy a few enquiries which have been received from time to time regarding the work reported to be going on at the Gold Reef property it is learned that this consists of two claims in the Shaw Township situated immediately north of the Hughes property.

A quartette of local men form the small syndicate which is working the claims of the Gold Reef, they being Messrs. Cameron, Dunan, Marshall and Jamieson.

From what can be gathered about two tons of ore per day is being run through a small mill and lumber has been sent out recently for necessary building on the property.

## Work Going Ahead At Hayden Mine

That development work is to be carried on to quite an extent at the Hayden property is indicated from the fact that a large boiler has been procured and sent on to the ground this week.

Arrangements have been made with the Wabi Ironworks of New Liskeard for the supplying of a compressor and considerable lumber has been sent to the property during the past week or two.

## WILL SPEND \$1,000 TO IMPROVE TIMMINS ROADS

### Councillors at Special Meeting This Week Decide to Follow Up on Government Work Just Completed

On the motion of Councillor A. E. Globe, seconded by Councillor E. Laflamme, the sum of \$1,000 will be expended on the improvement of certain roads in Timmins and a committee will be appointed to carry out the work.

This was the main item of business carried out at a special meeting of the Timmins Town Council held on Tuesday afternoon when those present were: Mayor Wilson, presiding; Messrs. A. R. Globe, Peters, E. McCoy, Dr. Moore, E. Laflamme and C. Dalton.

There were also present at the meeting a deputation from the Timmins Board of Trade consisting of Messrs. J. P. McLaughlin, H. J. Marshall and Dr. McInnes, whose main purpose in attending the meeting was to urge the Council to take some definite action in regard to the streets without delay.

The Board of Trade members addressed the City Fathers on the matter. Dr. McInnes suggested that they go ahead and complete the streets where the Government work had already been done to a certain extent and afterwards take on the other streets requiring attention. He thought that \$1,000 would cover all expenses in connection with the roads now that such considerable work had

been done by the Government.

It was thought that at least two months' work would require to be done to place the roads in a really efficient state and Councillor Dalton made the suggestion that more men and teams be put on the job and the work thus carried out more expeditiously.

The question of the kind of rock which should be used was discussed and other details regarding the carrying out of the work.

### Band Stand Expenditure.

A proposition was placed before the meeting regarding the erection of a Town band stand on the ball grounds and there was a variance of opinion as to just what should be spent on this, if anything.

"We could do without the music," claimed Dr. McInnes, "but we absolutely need the good roads."

Mr. Marshall: "Why not spend \$1,000 on the roads and \$50 on a band stand?"

On the motion of Councillor Globe, seconded by Councillor Peters, it was decided that an expenditure of \$100 be made on a band stand and a committee of three was appointed to look after the construction, they being Messrs. Globe, Moore and Peters.

It was in the course of conversation on the matter of livery charges for teams on the roads that Councillor Dalton slipped in unexpectedly to the surprise of some present.

In the opinion of Councillor Peters the liverymen got a good deal of benefit from the improvement of the roads and he considered the price of \$5.50 per day for teams should be made lower.

Dr. McInnes had suggested to the Council that owners of lots be compelled to remove stumps on the same and that if owners who were ordered to do so did not carry out the work then the Town should have the work done and charge the owners with the cost.

"Did you notice that the stumps on the road to Mattagami have all been removed," asked Councillor Dalton.

## German Heavy Attacks Repulsed With Many Losses at Vosges

## Five More Vessels Victims of Submarines--Lieut. Becker Died in Electric Chair To-day

LONDON.—BECAUSE OF DEVELOPMENTS, THE BRITISH CENSORS OFFICE HAS ORDERED THAT THE DETAILS OF ENEMY'S SUBMARINE OPERATIONS WILL NOT BE PASSED FOR PUBLICATION ABROAD.

PETROGRAD.—THIS CITY IS PREPARED FOR NEWS AT ANY TIME THAT THE GERMANS HAVE OCCUPIED WARSAW.

PARIS.—IN AN ATTEMPT TO RECOVER GROUND LOST AROUND SOUCHEZ AND IN VOSGES THE GERMANS MADE SEVERAL FIERCE ATTACKS LAST NIGHT BUT ALL WERE REPULSED WITH TERRIFIC LOSS AND BRITISH LINES ARE COMPARATIVELY QUIET.

## HUGHES VICTOR OVER FREEMAN IN 10 ROUNDS

### Second Meeting Between These Two Featherweights Was at Timmins Wednesday Night When Soo Boy Wins

The much discussed and speculated return bout between Billie Hughes, of the Soo and Jimmy Freeman, of Hailybury took place at the Coliseum on Wednesday night when Hughes, after ten fast rounds, was declared winner of the contest and thus retains the title of Featherweight Champion of Canada.

There was a larger attendance at the bout than on Dominion Day and the crowd in the ring included many visitors from outside points who had travelled specially to the gold camp to see the bout. Both Hughes and Freeman were accompanied from their respective homes by a goodly number of friends and supporters.

It is a matter for safe conjecture that which ever way a decision had been given there would be those who did not agree with the referee's final disposition of the laurels and at the conclusion of the bout, when the decision had become known, there was naturally diversion of opinion and a brief exciting dispute between the two featherweights which, however, was quickly settled when the heat of the moments had passed.

The referee was again Jack Faithful, who officiated so satisfactorily to every one concerned on July 1st. The timekeepers were Messrs. E. McCoy and C. Pierce.

Much amusement was created at the bout between the local men J. Theriault and R. Callum which, as the report below indicates, was decided in favor of the first named. It was sure a spirited contest between the two and was not of the length, of course, which the important bout of the night occupied.

The other preliminary between P. O'Neill, of Cobalt, and M. Austin, of Hailybury, was a good curtain raiser and resulted in a draw after five good rounds.

Some fifteen minutes were used up prior to the two featherweights getting down to work, this involving time devoted by the fighters in the

preparation of hand bandaging. This had been used by Hughes to the elbows but after a strenuous kick by Freeman Billie discarded the arm bandages.

Hughes was announced as turning the scale at 119 pounds as compared with 122 pounds on Dominion Day, while Freeman was at 122 pounds as against 124 pounds at the last encounter.

The main bout by rounds was as follows and for the writing of which The Advance is indebted to the experience and courtesy of Charles M. Auer:—

### THE MAIN BOUT.

Hughes was first man to enter ring and received a great ovation. He immediately started to bandage his hands and arms. Freeman followed shortly and also was given a great reception. On looking over Hughes' bandages, Freeman made a lick and Billie had to call for a knife to cut the surplus bandages off. It was announced by referee Jack Faithful that only 10 rounds would be fought and that a decision would be given. The crowd was much disappointed as it had been rumored that 15 rounds would be pulled off, although this is out of the question in Ontario. There was a few big bets to be made but when it was whispered of the change in number of rounds there was nothing doing. The Freeman backers were of opinion that Jimmy would go better over a longer route and his strength and ruggedness would wear the little speed marvel down, while Hughes' friends were confident in his science and skill to easily outpoint his rival, and some went as far as to say he would score a knockout in twelve rounds.

Well they started and such an exhibition of science and speed has never been seen in these parts. Both boys are clever and clean fighters.
