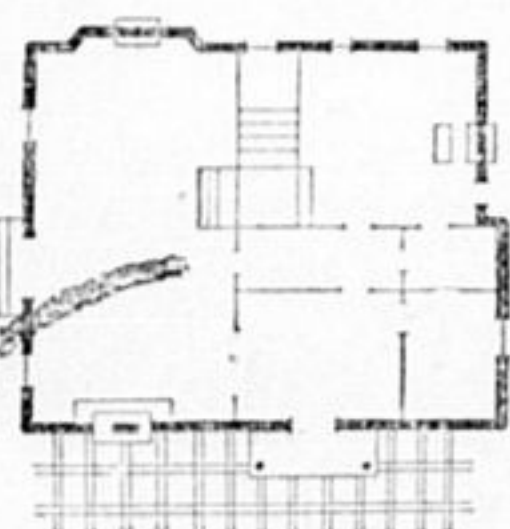

IN THE MAIL BAG

from the Front and Elsewhere

The following letter has been received by Mr. W. H. Pritchard, Ontario Military Hospital, Orpington, Kent.

Dear Will,—
I thought you would like to have a few lines. I have been waiting to thank you for the last box you sent for us but it seems to have gone astray. I got notice of it from Hazeley Downs but it has never arrived in France. I am trying to locate it now I am over here.

Well, I had the bad luck to get one of "Old Fritz's" bullets in the calf of the right leg. We were coming back from the trenches and I caught it coming overland about 600 yards from the lines. My leg is quite useless at present but the wound is healing nicely. It just grazed the inside of the shin bone. I am awfully thankful it was not worse like some of the poor fellows. It is really marvellous how some pull through. Poor P. S. Martin got it bad, I believe he lost his leg.

This is a lovely place; it was constructed by the Ontario Government and is run by them. The nurses and everyone are very nice.

I hope to get home convalescent in a week or so. It is rather funny, my leave was due about the first of July. Well, it is a treat to be away from the continual roar of the guns and explosions of the shells once more. We have had a pretty hard three months of it; of course, one is used to it, but there is an awful change away.

The Canadians have had it very warm since I have been over in the vicinity of Ypres where we were. Close to the last two weeks I was out there we were staying in a large tunnel we were building, just 300 yards from the "Hun" lines. We were tunneling in the bank of a canal and putting in corridors seven feet six inches square and putting in banks to accommodate troops. It was practically shell proof; but there was some rush work to be done on Hill 60 so we had to go out a couple of nights or else I would have probably been out there yet.

Well, I think this all this time and hope to be able to thank you for contents of box shortly. Kind regards to Mrs. Pritchard, Ed. and the boys.

Attractions at The Empire Theatre

King obtained a small part at Koerner's Garden in St. Louis, and played in dramatic stock there throughout the summer. The next year he went to New York and through a friend obtained a part in "A Queen of the Highway," which played in New York for five weeks, and then went on the road, King Baggot with it.

Later he played prominent roles in a number of well known productions including "Human Hearts," "The Sonny Man" and "The Wishing Ring."

Baggot's first idea of pictures was not an extremely complimentary one but upon concluding his season in "The Wishing Ring" in Chicago, he consented to make a try-out of pictures and signed a contract with Mr. Laemmle, which has been renewed with added salary each time for the last six years. It is safe to say that no other actor has exceeded him in length of service with the same company. Two of his most famous film productions are "Dr. Jekyll and Mr. Hyde" which was recently re-issued and "Shadows" a feature in which Mr. Baggot played ten different characters, and was the only person in the cast.
