**SOUTH PORCUPINE BOARD OF TRADE**  
An Important and Active Organization Doing Good Work for the Camp

Despite the summer dullness and the fact that a large number of people are absent from the camp on their vacations the South Porcupine Board of Trade is still the active and aggressive body that has characterized it from the start.

At its regular meeting held at the Townsite office in the King George Hotel, there were present seventeen members and a very large volume of business was taken up and disposed of.

Among other important matters taken up was the coming visit of the Ontario Associated Boards of Trade from Toronto and other points in the south. At a business meeting of this body in conjunction with the Northern Ontario Associated Boards to be held at Haileybury on August 14th, Messrs. H. N. Joy and Glen Henry were appointed as delegates to represent the South Porcupine Board. A committee of five was also appointed to look after the entertainment of the visiting Boards of Trade when they come to the Porcupine camp on August 15th. Messrs. Joy, Fuller, Gibson, Cook and Torrence were appointed.

A full and complete report of the special finance committee in charge of the celebration in connection with the opening of the Dome mill was also made by C. O. Weston and referred to an audit committee of three who will report at the next meeting of the Board.

Considerable other business was taken up and discussed before adjournment. The Board of Trade is undoubtedly accomplishing lots of good for the district in general and should be supported by every business and mining man in the camp. A recent circular letter sent out by A. S. Fuller, Secy-Treas., states that the Board is now regularly incorporated, having received its charter from the Government, and that it is desired that the membership be increased to at least 100 by the 1st of September.
