

Timmins News in Brief

Mr. Chas. S. Foster has joined the overseas battalion and will leave Montreal in the course of a month for active service.

The many friends of Mr. T. J. Lawlor will learn with regret that he has been compelled to go to the Haileybury Hospital being accompanied by Mrs. Lawlor.

Timmins is not on the map published by the Cochrane Board of Trade. It was very much on the map judging by the accomplishments of boys from the centre of the gold camp on Wednesday.

Much sympathy was expressed last week end with Mr. J. P. McLaughlin who received an urgent message to proceed to his home at Collingwood, at once. His mother, who had been taken ill only for a matter of a few hours had passed away very suddenly.

Congratulations are being extended Otto Kabel on his becoming the happy father of a daughter on Wednesday. Mrs. Kabel and the new arrival are getting along splendidly.

The night clerk at the Goldfields Hotel is now Jack Regan who is well known in Timmins as a shiner of the "pedal extremities" and guests at hotel may be assured of every courtesy and attention "at his hands" now.

A grand hall is announced to be held this evening at the big dining hall at Schumacher, under the direction of J. T. McGregor. Invitations have been issued and the function should be a success if the arrangements made are any criterion.

Mr. Tom McCauley, of the Northern Lumber Mills at North Cobalt was a visitor in town last week end making a hurried trip as he only arrived Saturday on the last train and returned on the early Monday train. As it is two years since Mr. McCauley was last in Timmins he was very much impressed and astounded at the extensive building operations being carried on and the great change for the better which the town showed.

Several comments have been heard regarding a map of the Cochrane district covering the goldfields, which is printed on stationery of the Cochrane Board of Trade. This, however, must be some four or five years old as Timmins is not even shown on the map. That the centre of the gold camp should be now made prominent cannot be denied and it has been suggested that the Timmins Board of Trade should take the matter up at their meeting to-night.

The church parade of the L. O. L. 2552, Timmins, last Sunday evening, a report of the service in connection with which is given elsewhere, was in charge of Bro. Chas. Sheridan as Director and the Master of the Timmins Lodge A. N. McClean and Master of South Porcupine Lodge, D. McDougall, were present. It was raining heavily at South Porcupine while it was fine at Timmins, otherwise there would probably have been thirty or forty more in the parade.

It is a noteworthy fact that many South Porcupine residents are making a regular habit of visiting the Empire Theatre at Timmins and last Monday evening was an excellent instance of the large number included in the audience. A significant point proving the excellent quality of pictures shown was that many of the audience could not refrain from applauding certain exciting scenes even though they were pictures—which goes to confirm the popular opinion that the movies are gaining ground in the estimation of the public every day.

Messrs. Marshall-Ecclestone, Limited, are having a brick vault placed in their premises by T. E. Strain. This will be 8 feet by 11 feet in outer dimensions and of 18-inch walls and will thus be absolutely fireproof.

The sum of \$37 was raised in a baseball match last week end between the Mine Managers and the Business Men of the Town. The Red Cross Society are desirous of extending their thanks through the Advance for this substantial sum given towards their object.

The bungalow being erected near the site for the new Presbyterian Church adjacent to the firehall, is rapidly nearing completion and the Pastor Mr. J. M. Allan will soon have a cozy little residence all for his own use. The exterior appearance and layout of the bungalow is a credit to those concerned with its erection.

A garden fete with Coney Island attractions is to be held at the residence of Mr. P. A. Robbins on Wednesday afternoon, August 25th by the members of the Ladies' Guild of Timmins. The announcement of course seems somewhat extraordinary but those who participate in the program will be assured of a real good time.

Nothing has been done among merchants of the town regarding early closing for the remainder of the summer months, every night of the week. That such steps would be justified seems to be the popular opinion as nobody would be seriously inconvenienced while the privilege would be greatly appreciated by both merchants and store clerks.

In The Advance Letterbox this week a letter appears regarding the closing of the Post Office on Wednesday which was Civic Holiday in Timmins.
