**UNSANITARY RESTAURANTS.**

There are other things besides fires which are dangerous to the welfare of a community, and one of the greatest of these is a lax condition of expert medical inspection of food, and the conditions generally surrounding the restaurants of Timmins. It is an undisputed fact that flies are a menace to health, and in a town where no drainage system is used the breeding places of these pests make them doubly obnoxious and the more to be guarded against in the interests of public health. The restaurants of Timmins are veritable havens for these harbingers of disease.

And in regard to meats purchased and served by nearly all these food dispensaries, it would seem that they are merely outlets for the sale of meats and other foodstuffs unfit for human consumption, and which retail purveyors could not hope to dispose of to the discerning housewife who chooses, with a practiced eye, the commodities which she buys.

Timmins is a mining town and consequently harbors a great many single men and others without home conditions, and these are forced by necessity to patronize the restaurants and trust to the proprietor to supply them with wholesome food. But their trusting faith evokes no response from the "strictly business" proprietor (most of whom are Chinamen). They buy the cheapest stuff they can get—absolute refuse—which would be consigned to the dump if it were not for these "culinary experts" who are allowed by the authorities to cook it up and feed it to their helpless victims. Some of the cellars of these places are also in a disgraceful condition.

We are informed of a car of meat which was refused at Schumacher, owing to its unsanitary condition, and later sent in to Timmins where it found a ready market.

These conditions are unbearable and unwarranted. We have a medical health officer and he should see to it that this state of affairs is remedied at once. Complaints are numerous and it has been drawn to the attention of the Advance in such a manner as to leave no doubt as to the temper of the people who have been obliged to submit to these conditions.

Let us have quick action in this matter as well as continual vigilance from now on. Let the health officer protect those who have not got the privilege of home conditions, to the extent of preventing unscrupulous restaurant keepers from foisting these insidious poisons into the systems of their patrons.

**BUILDING BY-LAW NEEDED.**

Now that a shake-up in fire department conditions is about to bear fruit and Timmins is slated to have a much improved fire-fighting machine, would it not be a step in the right direction if the Council took up the matter of greater fire prevention in conjunction with their generous provision for fire fighting.

Cochrane is providing for the future safety of their town by drafting a by-law which will permit the erection of frame buildings, within a specified central area, only for the space of two months, after which time the owner must erect a building of brick or other acceptable material, as well as complying with other pro-

**Market Letter Homer L. Gibson & Co.**

There is every indication that the mining stocks are hovering at or close to bottom, and the present summer lull is apt to be followed by sharp upward movements in the standard stocks at any time. During the most quiet period of the summer there has been a distinct lack of selling pressure, and the accumulation of any extensive line of the better stocks has been a difficult matter without "bidding up" for them.

Shrewd traders are now, however, accumulating these stocks in anticipation of decidedly higher prices within the next sixty days, when the public again enters the market, and we would confidently urge our clients to follow the lead while the present lull continues. We feel certain that the coming fall will witness substantial moves in the market in general. Profits on purchases made now are certain to be much larger than if commitments are postponed until activity is again resumed.

Conditions throughout the North country were never so satisfactory from a mining standpoint. There is a plethora of money for investment and speculation, and these conditions are certain to be reflected in the market so soon as attention is turned from holidaying to business. Many stocks in both the Porcupine and Cobalt lists now offer opportunities for almost certain substantial profits shortly.

**Market letter of A. S. Fuller & Co.**

The market for the past week has shown unmistakable signs of advancing and we are of the opinion that the next two or three weeks will show much higher prices.

A special sign of strength has been shown in West Dome Consol., Dome Lake and Vipond.

The advance in the price of silver metal to 66 1/4c has also had a bullish effect on the Cobalts and these stocks are all stronger, especially Temiskaming, which has advanced to 61c and looks like higher prices.

With the exception of a few disturbing conditions such as strikes and other unsettled labor conditions in the United States we can see nothing in the way of a big market this fall, and we advise our clients to accumulate a line of the best stocks, being confident that an advance of 25 to 50 per cent will be registered in a number of them inside the next sixty days. One thing we are sure of, and that is, that there should be no further delay in buying as we feel confident that the market has reached the bottom and is now on the way up.

visions which will mitigate, to a certain extent, against the risk of fire.

Timmins could have a by-law which would require owners of property within prescribed areas to conform to certain conditions, such as, for instance, where buildings become demolished by fire or torn down to make room for bigger structures, that in rebuilding the owners be obliged to put in brick party walls; approved chimneys; windows in the unused attic spaces between the ceiling and roof, as an aid to fire-fighting; no disconnected buildings on the rear of lots without the consent and approval of those whose duty it is to enforce such a by-law; and many other reasonable restrictions.

A great number of property owners, principally foreigners, build dwellings on both the front and rear of their lots. This practice should be frowned on by the authorities as it is only a commercial consideration by the owners, and an undoubted menace in case of fire.
